

### HAMMOND SUPERIOR COURTS

Mrs. Frances Berthold, Conkey avenue, Hammond, has gone into the courts to clear her name. She has filed suit for \$5,000 damages for slander against Mark Koszecki sometimes known as Mary Koch. The alleged slanderous statements are said to have been made on Aug. 17 when the plaintiff said in the presence of others that "Frances Berthold and Max Berthold are not married; they never were married," meaning, according to Mrs. Berthold that she and her husband were living in open and notorious adultery. The complaint was filed in the Hammond superior court through Attorneys McMahon & Conroy.

### GOLD BULLION LOST ON LINER

SAN FRANCISCO, Cal., Aug. 19.—Reported disappearance of \$10,000 in gold bullion from the strong boxes of the China mail liner Nile, between this port and Shanghai, puzzled local shipping officers. No trace of the missing gold, part of a \$3,000,000 treasure cache, was discovered, according to advices to China mail officers here, despite a rigid investigation following the discovery of the theft. Possibility that an organized gang of thieves is operating on trans-Pacific vessels and at Pacific and oriental ports is strong, shipping men declare.

### REPUBLICANS WON'T BE BLACKMAILED

consider was entered on the journal and makes it within his power today or tomorrow to call up for reconsideration at any time he desires. These two days no one else can call it up. After two days Speaker Walker loses his sole right to move a reconsideration and any member can do so. The probable suffrage tactics will be to call it up the first thing on the third day, table the reconsideration motion and thereupon prevent the house from reversing its action on ratification. Legislators recalled that in the history of the house a measure had never been successfully called up for reconsideration. There were always a few members who would vote against reconsideration no matter how hard they had fought against the original bill it was claimed.

### BRIBERY IS ALLEGED

There are persistent rumors in circulation that charges will be made on the floor of the house by anti-landers this morning that the bribery of a member of the house by suffrage leaders was responsible for yesterday's ratification. Anti-landers claim they will ask the matter be referred to an investigating committee. The charges looked upon with little fear by ratificationists, who claimed they have similar matter of their own to present. The name of Rep. Harry Burn, the republican who changed his vote from the anti ranks on the motion to table, to the suffrage ranks on ratification is that used by the anti in connection with bribery. It was alleged in affidavits that Rep. Hanover, ratification floor leader, had offered him a large sum. Hanover declared that "these affidavits are false in letter and in spirit."

### USED FOR COERCION

"I decline to be blackmailed." Burn declared that "before I saw these affidavits I had already heard they were in existence and that they

### probably would be used in some effort to coerce me into changing my vote on the motion to reconsider, or in some other way to injure or defeat the cause of woman suffrage."

Persons who overheard the conversations between Hanover and Burn were indignant at the charge of the anti-suffragists.

### Legal steps are being taken to prevent Secretary of State of Tennessee Stevens from certifying to the federal secretary of state the fact of a ratification. In event the anti fail to block suffrage by re-consideration, papers will immediately be filed in some state court to tie up the amendment.

Judge Joseph Higgins, president of the Tennessee Constitutional League, has prepared the papers.

### STRUGGLE TO BE INTENSE

There is no diminution of the intensity of the struggle. The anti have arranged to have hundreds of telegrams sent to every member who voted for ratification protesting against his vote. On the other hand even a greater number is coming from friends of suffrage throughout the state to the men who aided them. Every suffrage member is on the watch-out for an anti attempt to re-consider when some of the suffrage forces are

### out of the room. It is rumored also that Walker will bring up his re-consideration motion this morning immediately after charges of bribery have been made, hoping to put it over then.

Walker refuses to make a statement. "I have no statement to make until it is all over," he declared "and that will not be for two or three days. Let them shout now if they want to."
