BASEBALL FACING AN EARTHQUAKE

 NEW YORK, Aug. 27.—Baseball stands today facing an earthquake that may make shakes it has received in the past seem like the vertiginous quiver. One American league baseball club—the Cleveland Indians, has signed a round robin resolution in which every player agrees to refuse to play ball against Carl Mays, the unfortunate pitcher who pitched the ball that killed Ray Chapman in New York last week. Other clubs have been asked to sign it and in baseball circles it is believed others will. If the trouble comes to a show-down, and it seems it will, grave results are expected.

The Yankees, exercising their rights under the rules of organized ball, will claim each game their opponents refuse to play by forfeit. There will be nothing for the umpire to do but forfeit them the contest since Mays is a regularly signed member of the Yankees and is good standing with organized baseball. Next the league will extract from each club the players who perpetrate this strike a fine of \$1,000 the penalty for refusal to carry out scheduled contests.

Every ball player involved in such action automatically will violate his contract and be open to action. His contract may become void immediately and he may lose his standing in baseball. Mays cannot be injured by such action. He has signed a contract that makes certain his salary whether or not he plays.

WHITE TRIES OUT OFFICIAL SCALES FOR MORAN BOUT

Charley White, who will meet Pal Moran at East Chicago Saturday afternoon, made a special trip to the city last night to test his weight on the official scale. This showed him to be at 155 pounds, one pound over the stipulated mark, which he must make at 10 o'clock tomorrow morning. At his training camp the scale showed him to be 135 1/2, showing a difference of three-quarters of a pound between the scales. Charley will take no chances and promises to be at the stipulated weight on the official register.

Mays is the pitcher who hit Ray Chapman, Cleveland shortstop, causing his death.





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
