TWIN CITY LIBRARIES

"KNOW YOUR INDUSTRY."
Today we have with us:
TWIN CITY LIBRARIES.
One of the most important activities in this or any other section is the public libraries, who have done much for the betterment of education among both American and foreign born children and their parents.
It was through the efforts of Mrs. J. D. Kennedy, then president of the Tuesday Evening Reading Club, which is now known as the Woman's Club that the library buildings became certainty.
The first steps towards the erection of a building was taken in 1908 and Mrs. Kennedy appointed a committee to secure funds for the purpose of purchasing books.
In May, 1913, on a suggestion of Mrs. A. Ottenheimer a tag day was held and a large sum of money was contributed. The ladies solicited funds until the latter part of 1909, when a committee went before the city council and petitioned that body to pass an ordinance to make a levy for a library maintenance. The council unanimously voted to levy one mill on the dollar which was the maximum levy.
The first library board consisted of Mrs. A. H. W. Johnson and John Farovold and was appointed by the school board in 1909 to serve two years. Mrs. E. V. Walton and George W. Lewis were appointed by the city council to serve one year. Dr. A. A. Ross, J. G. Allen and Mrs. J. D. Kennedy were appointed by the circuit judge to serve one, two and three years. This board was organized in September 1909 by electing J. G. Allen, president Dr. A. A. Ross, vice president, and Mrs. J. D. Kennedy, secretary.
The matter of a Carnegie library was discussed in Sept 1910 and Dr. Ross, Mr. Farovold, Mrs. Johnson and the librarian, Miss Sweeney, were appointed to take the matter up with Mr. Carnegie. Their effort proved successful and Mr. Carnegie donated \$40,000 for two libraries to be located in Indiana Harbor and East Chicago.
In March, 1910, the first two libraries were opened to the public with a total of 733 books on the library shelves. The third library now located at Calumet was opened December 1915.
Today these three libraries have on hand 22,200 books, touching upon every subject known throughout the world. The fourth library building is now under consideration and when all plans have been completed will be located somewhere in the Mark Sub-division.
Great compliments are due to Mrs. J. D. Kennedy, the originator of the public libraries in the Twin Cities and to the present Librarian Francis Kendall Byers, who has worked very hard in placing the Library system of the Twin Cities, among the most popular of the State of Indiana.
The present officers of the Library Board include H. R. DeHoll, president; J. C. Roppa, Vice-President; Mrs. J. D. Kennedy, Secretary and Frances Kendall Byers, Librarian. The directors of the board consist of J. R. Farovold, John O'Neil, Mrs. J. C. Dickson, and Mrs. Willard B. VanHorn.
