

### EMPLOYERS REFUSE TO DEAL WITH WORKERS

#### Union Clothing Workers Strike in New York City Remains Unchanged

(INTERNATIONAL NEWS SERVICE) NEW YORK, Dec. 8.—While union clothing workers' pickets were stationed outside a half dozen clothing manufacturing plants, employers stood their ground today and refused to deal with representatives of 65,000 workers unless they accepted the principal of the open shop and reduced wages. Manufacturers who contend these conditions are necessary to permit competition with other markets, plan to frame rules Saturday governing the newly inaugurating work shop conditions.

Meanwhile union officials were endeavoring to line up all the 150,000 men and women garment and needle workers in an effort to force a back down by the employers.

### GOVERNOR PREPARES DRASTIC ACTION

(INTERNATIONAL NEWS SERVICE) NEW YORK, Dec. 8.—I shall preserve order and force respect for the law in Mingo county if I have to call out every able bodied man in the state and ask for the entire U. S. army," reiterated Gov. John J. Cornwell, of West Virginia today, in commenting on his speech before the Southern Society here last night. The governor added: "The Miners' Union has got to cut out the rough stuff. Labor unions must respect the law and must put out the radicals from their midst."

The governor declared the coal strike a year ago was broken by the 40,000 to 45,000 non-union miners in West Virginia who produced 300,000 tons of coal a day and "furnished the fuel to keep the railroads running."

#### UNION LEADER TALKS

Indianapolis, Ind., Dec. 8.—Gov. Cromwell did not talk about calling out able bodied men to protect citizens when men were being beaten by Baldwin-Felts detectives employed by the coal operators of West Virginia, said William Green, secretary-treasurer of the United Mine Workers of America, to the International News Service today.

The union leader's statement was made in reply to the assertion made in New York by Gov. John B. Cornwell of West Virginia, that he shall preserve order and force respect for the law and authority in Mingo county "even if he has to call out every able bodied man in the state and ask for the entire U. S. army."

"The rough stuff" referred to in the statement has been practiced by these bandings of the coal corporations," said Green.

#### Valparaiso Man Honored

VALPARAISO, Ind., Dec. 8.—Herman Hagen, Sr., of this city, has just been honored by the Odd Fellows lodge of this city and by the subordinate grand lodge of Indiana. The Valparaiso man is more than 87 years old and for 40 years has been identified with the order.

The local lodge conferred on him the highest honors in its power and the subordinate grand lodge recommended his appointment as special aid-de-camp, with the rank of colonel, on the staff of G. M. Hermonston, general commander of Toronto, Canada. Mr. Hagen has received this appointment from General Hermonston, and the honor is given to only one man in the state for a term of two years.

#### GARY MEN LOSE CLOTHING

MICHIGAN CITY, Ind., Dec. 8.—George Gales and H. Englehardt, of Gary, late Saturday evening reported to the local police that while their car, in which they were making the trip to this city from Gary, was stalled in a ditch eight miles west of the city and they were hunting a farm house to get help to pull it out, someone stole two bags from the car. The bags contained clothing.

#### NEW WARFARE THREATENED

BERLIN, Dec. 8.—Warfare is threatened in upper Silesia if the Germans defeat the Poles in the forthcoming plebiscite in that disputed territory, according to a dispatch from Warsaw today. This dispatch quoted from an interview given by Korfants, head of the Polish propaganda bureau in Upper Silesia to the Warsaw Gazette.

### BRITISH UNEMPLOYED FOMENTING TROUBLE

#### Organizing for Direct Action and Seize Property in Many Cases

BY HARLE C. REEVES (STAFF CORRESPONDENT I. N. SERVICE) LONDON, Dec. 8.—British unemployed are organizing for direct action. A general staff has been formed. It was learned today. The officers will wear red badges in the form of rosettes. Headquarters have been established at Islington to direct demonstrations in London. The Islington headquarters are constantly guarded by armed men. Scenes of disorders lead the government to adopt a policy of aloofness towards the seizures where no damage was being done to property.

For the most part the seizures were carried out in orderly fashion without interference by the police. In a few instances, however, the police attempted to interfere, leading to reprisal threats by leaders of the unemployed.

Municipal offices of seven subdivisions of greater London have been occupied by unemployed to shelter their families.

More than 200 vacant houses have been commandeered by the unemployed. The general staff of the unemployed "army" has formulated long lists of demands which have been sent to fifty mayors in London and suburban cities. These demands have been turned over to the home office which is studying the unemployment question.

The unemployed are threatening to march upon White Hall and to make a great demonstration in front of parliament building and the premier's official residence in Downing st. but the exact time of the demonstration is not known.

Gloomy predictions as to the British economic outlook are being made in parliamentary debate upon the unemployment situation.

One of the latest seizures was at Acton where 500 unemployed seized the municipal baths yesterday.

An organization known as the Federal Council of Unemployed has been organized. Madame Trug, one of the officers, declared in a speech that the local organizations would receive the full support of the national body in seizures and other activities. Local councils of the organization have already been established in 25 boroughs of London and others are being formed.

Fears of disorders lead the government to adopt a policy of aloofness towards the seizures where no damage was being done to property.


Parents of a mechanic's son is asked in a suit filed by George P. Donahoe et al. against the Good & Peppier Motor corp. et al.
