

Says Jap Demagogues Will Be Responsible

(INTERNATIONAL NEWS SERVICE) WASHINGTON, Dec. 9.—If the statesmen, the publicists, the politicians, the writers and the demagogues of Japan really want war with the U. S., they will be the ones to bring it on and not the Americans, Rep. Kahn, of California, declared in a speech in the house this afternoon, discussing the Japanese problem.

"I have no fear that there will be war between Japan and the U. S. in my life time. And I am thoroughly satisfied that if my country remains unshakably prepared there will be no difficulty between the two nations at any time."

THREATEN TO WITHDRAW

VIENNA, Dec. 9.—Jugo-Slavia, Roumania and Czechoslovakia have threatened to withdraw from the league of nations if Bulgaria is admitted to membership, according to a Geneva dispatch to the New York Times today.


WHY THEY ARE COMING HERE

(INTERNATIONAL NEWS SERVICE) NEW YORK, Dec. 9.—Reasons why European immigrants are flocking to America at the rate of a million a year were revealed today by a canvass of immigrants at Ellis Island by Tracy W. Redding, sociologist student at Columbia University. These reasons were given him:

- From Italy—Because of depreciated currency in pay envelopes.
- From Poland—To escape radical conflicts and poverty.
- From Ireland—To seek better employment and more tranquil lives. Immigrants chiefly Irish girls.
- From Czechoslovakia—To escape European turmoil.
- From Portugal—Political disorders and depreciated currency.
- From Spain—Labor troubles, syndicalism and high costs of living.

Hints to the Housewife

To Restore Color to Fabrics after it has been removed in one or two spots by contact with an acid sponge with ammonia and water and then with chloroform.

To Renovate Black Leather articles such as belts, bags, portfolios, brief cases, etc., beat the yolks of 2 eggs and the white of 1 with 1 tablespoonful alcohol and 1 teaspoonful sugar. Stir in enough powdered ivory black (obtainable at a paint store) to make a thick paste. Rub well into the leather surface.

To Clean Bronze Ornaments do not wash, dust carefully and wipe with a soft cloth moistened with paraffin oil. Polish with camellia.

To Keep Your Floor Dark apply a stain made by adding ozonate crystals to a gallon of water, quarter pound potassium permanganate and applying to the floor. Protect by a coat of varnish or shellac. In addition to coloring the floor this preparation, though poisonous if taken internally, is a powerful disinfectant.

Brown Sugar if kept in the refrigerator will not lump. Keep in open jar or dish.

To Cream Butter Quickly first heat the bowl well with scalding water. Pour out the water, wipe dry and put in the butter at once. It will cream in a very few moments.

To Make Strong Buttonholes mark the buttonhole on the material with a pencil, then sew around it with the sewing machine. Cut and make the buttonhole over the outline of machine stitching.

When Making Silk Covered Buttons place a piece of outing flannel inside the silk before covering the molds, and they will look better and wear longer.

To Remove the Burned Crust of a Cake rub gently with fine, clean sandpaper; or grate on the fine side of a tin grater.

To Dry Herbs. Wash thoroughly, shake off as much water as possible, and spread on a sheet of clean blotting paper

in a large drip pan. Dry in a very moderate oven, with the oven door open. When cool pack in airtight receptacles.

To Clean Chandeliers. If they are made of brass, sponge with hot vinegar and salt, rinse with soap and polish with flannel or chamolins moistened with a few drops of paraffin or sewing machine oil. To remove fly specks, sponge with alcohol. For gilt chandeliers, rub with cut lemon and sponge with tepid suds of white soap containing baking soda in the proportion of 1 teaspoonful to a pint of water. Use a soft brush if the fixture is ornamented.

To Remove Chewing Gum from clothing, place the spot where the gum sticks between two flat pieces of ice and let it stand until the gum becomes so brittle that it can be scraped off with the back of a knife or by rubbing gently between the fingers.

When Melting Chocolate grease the bowl in which it is melted and you will not waste the quantity which usually sticks to the sides.

To Keep the Hands Young. After the hands have been in water for a long time, they should be rubbed with powdered starch.

Stains on the fingers may be removed by rubbing with dry mustard or by rinsing in a little mustard water.

An especially good way to keep the hands from looking old is to soak the hands a few moments in warm water, wipe with a warmed towel, and when they are thoroughly warmed place for a few moments in a bowl of sweet almond oil which has been warmed.

Grass Rugs or Matting that look shabby and faded may be revived with two coats of good floor paint. They should first be washed with strong soda water to remove grease, and thoroughly dried. Stretch and tack to the floor before painting.




