

PORTFOLIOS WON'T BE XMAS GIFTS

President-Elect Has Not Done All His Christmas Selecting in the Matter of Cabinet Jobs.

 MARION, O., Dec. 22.—President-elect Harding has done most of his Christmas shopping but he has a collection of gifts on his desk for whom he has not yet selected recipients. Among these are ten new cabinet portfolios. It is exceedingly doubtful, however, if he makes his decisions in time to slip a cabinet position into any of the many gaping Christmas stockings hung up in expectation.

The pressure of recommendation and objection for and against candidates is growing stronger each day, although Senator Miles Polidexter is the first of the Harding visitors openly to announce that he came specifically to make recommendations about a cabinet post.

Strength was added to Polidexter's plea for Joseph Dixon, of Montana, as secretary of the interior, by the fact that Dixon is thoroughly familiar with reclamation work in the west, to which the new administration is pledged. He also is counted among the progressive wing of the republican party, recognition for which is desired.

Senator A. B. Fall, of New Mexico, is intimated, undoubtedly could have the interior portfolio if he cared for it. He also was a Roosevelt supporter and would give the far west representation in the Harding official family.

But Senator Fall, it is known, wishes to become secretary of state and it is said has not yet been definitely eliminated for consideration for that post.

There seems to be a consensus of opinion that Harry M. Dougherty will be named as attorney-general; that Will Hays will take on the task of re-organizing the postoffice department and that Henry Wallace will become secretary of agriculture. Much discussion has arisen over the possibility of including Senator Weeks, of Massachusetts, in the cabinet. One objection outlined here seems to be that the determination to have Vice President Coolidge sit as a cabinet officer without portfolio would give Massachusetts adequate representation. Weeks has been mentioned for both treasury, war and navy.

Senator New of Indiana, it is known as the best authority, is disinclined to fracture the senate for the cabinet, but should he do so, the department of war is the only one he would consider. Rep. Kahn, of California, is being urged for that post, and may, it is said, would approve the appointment of Senator Chamberlain, of Oregon, who failed for re-election.

The candidates for the post of secretary of labor are not particularly numerous. Herbert Hoover is being advocated by those who know his close relations with both employers and employees.

John L. Lewis, president of the United Mine Workers, is regarded as a possibility, as is Rep. Nolan, of California, who holds a union card and has sponsored much progressive labor legislation.

REMAINS OF FLORIST BURIED IN MICHIGAN

The remains of Phillip D. Mann, well known florist of the Calumet region, and the friend of hundreds of children throughout East Chicago and Indiana Harbor, are being laid to rest today at the home of his birth place, Munroe, Michigan.

BORN IN MICHIGAN
 Phillip D. Mann was born on a farm at Munroe, Michigan, August 11th, in 1882, or at the time of the great Civil war. When he was but 15 years of age, he left the farm and finished his education in a public school near his home.

MARRIED SCHOOL TEACHER
 When but a young man of about 22 years, Mr. Mann met and won Miss Ida Godfrey, a school teacher, and after a long courtship were wedded at Munroe, Michigan, at which place Mr. Mann has hundreds of friends.

In 1901 Mr. Mann came to East Chicago and immediately secured a position in the office of the Indiana Harbor Belt R. R. Co., with which company he was with until the end of his untimely death.

During the 17 years with which Mr. Mann has been in the service of the I. H. R. R. Co. he has held a number of responsible positions. About three years ago, he was transferred to the position of a switchtender in the yards at Gibson.

FORMER CITY OFFICIAL
 In 1916 Mr. Mann was appointed by Former Mayor Frank Callahan, to serve on the Park Board, which appointment he held until May of this year.

Mr. Mann was instrumental in securing the little park at Calumet for the people of that district, and had
