

### GARY BOND CASE IN VALPO COURT

(SPECIAL TO THE TIMES)  
VALPARAISO, Ind., May 6.—The legal battle over \$33,000 worth of liberty bonds will begin in the Porter superior court tomorrow morning when attorneys for the defendant in the case of Ella Faber vs. Herman Faber will endeavor to have the case stricken from the trial calendar. The case has just recently been filed in the local court coming from Lake county on a charge of venue. The bonds in question are part of a large amount which the plaintiff is supposed to have found in a taxicab in Chicago. The incident attracted great attention in Lake county and the forthcoming law suit in Valparaiso promises to be bitterly fought. W. J. Whitney of Hammond represents the plaintiff, while McMahon and Conroy of Hammond and Kelly & Gaylin of this city, are attorneys for the defendant.

### GARY NEWS

#### APRIL POLICE REPORT

Drunks were the chief offenders of the law in Gary during the month of April and violators of the state law was given a place second place according to the monthly police report issued by Chief of Police Forstis this morning.

Of the 255 persons arrested during the past month 49 were drunks, 40 for violating the state liquor law, 28 for gambling and 21 for vagrancy. Ninety of them paid fines in the city court, 29 were appealed, 74 released, 21 turned over to other officers, 23 cases are pending, 18 notice posted and 12 fined and sent to jail. \$2,641.25 was paid in the city court in fines, crimes numbered 30 different offenses and of those arrested there were 23 different nationalities. The police served 556 meals to prisoners, took care of 550 night lodgers, made 767 runs with the patrol wagons covering a total mileage of 2,110 miles.

#### Gary Woman Jumps In Front of Train

Mrs. George Bolash, 2222 W. 10th avenue, Tolleston, who threw herself in front of a Michigan Central flyer

at the Tolt street crossing in Gary night before last, is still in an unconscious condition at the Mercy hospital and has but little chance to recover, according to attending physicians late this morning.

Suffering from a fractured skull and severe internal injuries she has not gained consciousness since the attempted suicide.

#### TWO GARY LADS MISSING

Search was instituted shortly after 10 o'clock for two Gary boys, Howard Walker, 425 Fimere street, and Carl Cecil, 334 Monroe street, who left for Miller beach yesterday morning and have not been seen or heard of since. Parents of the missing lads called the police station and ask the assistance of the police in locating them.

#### TWO INJURED IN GARY AUTO CRASH

Carl Linn, 227 Elsworth street, Tolleston, and Harry Edmonds, well known Gary man, were both cut by flying glass and severely injured last night when a Ford driven by Edmonds crashed into a trolley pole on Fifth avenue.

According to a police report on the accident Linn was intoxicated and while attempting to get ahead of the steering wheel Edmonds lost control of the machine and it struck a trolley pole. The front of the machine was demolished.

CROWN POINT, Ind., May 6.—Crown Point was spared the expense of a primary, but is assured a lively campaign this fall in the race of Ed Glover and Claude Allman for mayor. Ed Glover is the deputy recorder, who is running for mayor on the independent ticket, which calls itself the "Young Men's Ticket." Mayor Claude Allman seeks reelection on the republican ticket.

### STATE OFFICIAL IN HAMMOND

Supt. George N. Mansfield, state fisheries and game division, department of conservation, arrives in Hammond this afternoon and will have time to meet some of the leading sportsmen of this section. He will be at Paul Smith's hotel on Wolf lake early enough before the banquet tonight to hold an informal confab with devotees of the rod and gun.

The banquet committee promises a menu that will be in keeping with the event. State Organizer A. E. Hodine says that the motion pictures of fishing and hunting scenes to be shown are the finest that have been produced anywhere, actual catches of large game fish and camping scenery enough to gladden the heart of even the tenderfoot. The time is called for the first course at 6:20.

### GERMAN CABINET HAS RESIGNED

BERLIN, May 5.—Formation of a new ministry to succeed the Fehrenbach-Simons cabinet which resigned Wednesday was undertaken today. A conference of party leaders was held during the morning when it was virtually agreed to construct a cabinet with representatives of the same parties that were represented in the old ministry.

### JOB PRINTERS BACK AT WORK

CHICAGO, May 5.—Job printers, who have been on strike here for several days, trying to practically every union printing plant in the city, returned to work this morning. An agreement between the men and their employer whereby the workmen are granted a 44 hour week but agree to a reduction in wages amounting to \$4.35 per week was reached.

### BUSINESS CONDITIONS

WASHINGTON, May 5.—Although there is an improvement in financial conditions there is no indication of general improvement in business conditions, Secretary of Treasury Mellon said yesterday.

Requirements for loans upon banks are becoming less, the secretary said, and banks had conditions easier. Reports of business conditions, however, do not tend to indicate any rapid return to normalcy. Seasonal increases in business are shown in some industries, but generally banks report that pay roll requirements are becoming somewhat less.

### MAY HAVE SUGAR EXCISE

WASHINGTON, May 5.—Secretary of the Treasury Mellon is considering the placing of an excise tax on sugar, it was learned.

The secretary stated that when he recommended to congress that excise taxes might be levied on certain staple products to raise revenue lost by the repeal of other taxes, that he had sugar in mind, although he had not definitely decided to recommend a tax upon this commodity.

### MELLON MAKES A PREDICTION

WASHINGTON, May 6.—A general relaxation of bank re-discount rates was predicted by Secretary of the Treasury Mellon yesterday. Commercial rates are lowering and it may be expected that the bank rates will be reduced, the secretary said. Although he made it plain that such action would be taken on the initiative of the reserve banks and would not be recommended by the federal reserve board.

### PORTS FEEL PINCH OF STRIKE

WASHINGTON, May 6.—With ports on the Atlantic, Pacific and Gulf coasts beginning to feel the pinch of the marine strike, efforts to bring an end to the controversy were renewed here today with prospects for settlement appearing brighter than at any time since the walkout began last Sunday.

Another get-together meeting was scheduled today between the secretary of labor, Admiral Benson, chairman of the shipping board, and the leaders of the marine engineers. Representatives of the ship owners are here, and they may sit in at the conference later in the day.

Despite outward appearances, it became known today that both sides are in a conciliatory mood.
