## CALL SQUADS FOR INITIAL PRACTICE

Most Brilliant Season in Years For Football Is Predicted

 CHICAGO, Sept. 15.—What is expected to be one of the most brilliant and successful football seasons in the middle west in years was officially launched today when coaches of the "Big Ten" universities summoned their gridiron squads for the initial practice of the year. From now until October 1 when the first important games on the schedule will be played each coach will drive his men hard in an attempt to produce a championship aggregation.

Early indications are that the "Big Ten" colleges will present several well-balanced, powerful eleven and that the battle for the championship will be hard-fought. Ohio State last year's champion, Illinois, Wisconsin and Michigan are the teams most often mentioned as title probabilities, with Minnesota, Chicago and Indiana likely to upset the odds by winning.

Besides the Big Ten schools Notre Dame also began active practice today with forty-five candidates reporting to Coach Rockne.

Coaching staffs of the Big Ten schools remain the same except at Purdue where William H. "Lone Star" Dietz has succeeded "Butch" Scanlon.

## FORESTERS IN TITULAR CONTEST

The same team that represented Hammond, the whole season, will take the field against De Soto Court.

Meyers, Fleischer, McCarthy and Kolling will cover the infield and Callahan, Mulney and Roski will patrol the gardens with Albert and Schultz available for relief duty. Hammond will be well represented as many fans will accompany the team. Special coaches will be provided and a hat round trip rate of \$1.50 will be charged. ## PURDUE READY TO RIDE INTO PRACTICE SEASON

Kellogg, Dietz and Lambert Discuss Training Season With Candidates.

LAFAYETTE, Ind., Sept. 15.—Purdue lifted the lid on its 1921 football season yesterday when candidates for the varsity eleven met with Athletic Director Nelson A. Kellogg, Coach William H. Dietz and Assistant Coach Ward Lambert on Stuart field and discussed the opening of the season practice season today. It happened this year that the university opened just one day before the official gridiron season.

 Coach Dietz arrived here in time for the meeting, having come from Pittsburgh, where for three weeks he has been with Glenn Warner, the famous coach of the University of Pittsburgh, who years ago was Dietz's coach at Carlisle Indian School, the Purdue coach having been a star at Carlisle about ten years ago.

Today's program was to include a short talk by Coach Dietz and remarks by Director Kellogg and Coach Lambert, after which the head coach was to outline his policy to the men and urge them to put forth their best effort this year. He is familiar with the ability of the various candidates as the spring training this year was unusually effective. Forty of the men are to be fitted out with football togs Thursday afternoon and the remainder of the candidates will receive uniforms Friday.

With but two weeks to whip his team into condition for the opening game with Wabash on October 1, the Purdue instructor plans to start intensive drill without delay. The fact that only Stanwood, center, and Cooley, guard, are missing from last year's first string, will give the coach an advantage, as he will have experienced men for nearly all positions. Captain Carmen arrived last evening and is in the condition.

## WANT DEMPSEY TO BOX JOHNSON IN BOSTON BOUT

BOSTON, Mass., Sept. 15.—A proposal to hold here on Oct. 12 a six round no decision bout between Jack Dempsey and Jack Johnson was announced yesterday by George J. Higgin, state adjutant of the Disabled American Veterans of the World War.

Johnson, he said, had agreed, and it was believed Dempsey would do so. Higgin said he was drawing up a formal application to the state boxing commission. The proceeds would be used for the relief of disabled soldiers.

Eugene Buckley, chairman of the boxing commission, said the commission was opposed to allowing any professional of the class of Dempsey or Johnson to appear in the state.

## French Want U. S. Coaches to Train Olympic Athletes

NEW YORK, Sept. 15.—France has sent to the United States for coaches to train its athletes for the Olympic games of 1924.

This information was imparted today to amateur athletic union officials by Allan H. Muhr, assistant commissary-general of the Olympic games, who has just arrived in this country.

Muhr said he was seeking two swimming coaches and four track coaches. It is planned to have one supervising coach for track and field events, with three assistants. Candidates, Muhr said, would have to be men with reputations already made.
