


MARKETS

NEW YORK, Sept. 15.—The stock market closed weak today. Heavy selling appeared just before the close and practically the entire list fell to the lowest levels of the day. The

losses ranged from 1 to over 2 points. Steel common yielded to 77 1/2 but recovered to 77 3/4 at the close. Baldwin after selling above 91 dropped to 88 1/2. Mexican Petro yielded two points to 115. Studebaker fell nearly 2 points to 75 1/2. The rails also reacted, Reading falling over one point to 79 1/2 and Great Northern Fwd. 1 1/2 to 76. Government bonds unchanged; railway and other bonds weak.

20 Western States who last year operated at a loss are expected soon by Clyde M. The desire of Terre Haute and Evansville to have their own branches of the court is said to have inspired the plan to divide the state into east and west districts with Fort Wayne, Indianapolis and New Albany in the east district.

SEEK NEW FEDERAL JUDGE IN INDIANA

Lake County Bar Association to Adopt Resolution.

Action of the Lake County Bar Association at a special meeting next Monday is expected to have a decided effect in the controversy over the proposed redistricting of the federal court in Indiana. A committee of which Joseph Conroy is chairman was appointed at a meeting of the association this week to prepare a report on the subject. The report was being written today and it was said the committee favored the plan to divide the state into East and West districts instead of disposing of the matter by the appointment of an additional federal judge as arranged in a bill now in congress. The present branches of the federal court are at Indianapolis, Hammond, Fort Wayne and New Albany. The ma-
