## A Call for a Practical Printer.

The Union men of Blackford County, in this State, have raised \$300 in money, which they propose to *donate* to any good, practical printer who will bring a press to, and publish a Union paper in that County. They will also aid in getting up a large subscription list, and promise a fair advertising and job patronage. There is but one paper published in the County at present, and that is a vile secession sheet. It is our opinion that a Union paper would do well in that section.

Recruiting is going on rapidly in this County. Lieutenant G. H. Bonebrake has about 75 or 80 men, and will go into camp near this place within a few days. He will have one of the best companies in the Sixty-ninth Regiment. With but a few exceptions, they are hardy, able-bodied men—such as have not been sent to the war heretofore. The organization of this company will take place to-morrow, (Saturday.) Several other officers are recruiting, some with pretty fair success, among whom we may mention Lieut. William Burres, of Farmland. Randolph will soon have her quota of 200 men in the field.

In another column will be found the card of the Commercial College recently established at Muncie, Ind., by Prof. W. H. Bush. The branches taught at this institution are Single and Double Entry Book Keeping; Spencerian System of Penmanship; Mental and Written Arithmetic; English Grammar; Algebra and Elocution.

## A Proclamation

BY THE PRESIDENT OF THE UNITED STATES OF AMERICA.

In pursuance of the sixth section of the act of Congress entitled "An act to suppress insurrection, to punish treason and rebellion, to seize and confiscate the property of rebels, and for other purposes," approved July 17, 1862, and which act, and the joint resolution explanatory thereof, are herewith published, I, Abraham Lincoln, President of the United States, do hereby proclaim to and warn all persons within the contemplation of said sixth section to cease participating in, aiding, countenancing, or abetting the existing rebellion, or any rebellion against the United States, and to return to their proper allegiance to the United States, on pain of the forfeitures and seizures as within and by said sixth section provided.

In testimony whereof I have hereunto set my hand and caused the seal of the United States to be affixed.

Done at the City of Washington, this 25th day of July, in the year of our Lord one thousand eight hundred and sixty-two, and of the independence of the United States the eighty-seventh.

TRE SIXTH SECTION.

Annexed is the sixth section of the Confiscation act referred to by the President in the above proclamation:

Sec. 6. And be it further enacted, That if any person within any State or Territory of the United States, other than those named as aforesaid, after the passage of this act, being engaged in armed rebellion against the Government of the United States, or aiding or abetting such rebellion, shall not, within sixty days after public warning and proclamation duly given and made by the President of the United States, cease to aid, countenance, and abet such rebellion, and return to his allegiance to the United States, all the estate and property, monies, stocks, and credits of such person shall be liable to seizure as aforesaid, and it shall be the duty of the President to seize and use them as aforesaid, or the proceeds thereof, and all sales, transfers or conveyances of any such property after the expiration of said sixty days from the date of such warning and proclamation, shall be null and void; and it shall be a sufficient bar to any suit brought by such person for the possession or use of such property, or any of it, to allege and prove that he is one of the persons described in this section.

Gen. Pope takes the Field.

WASHINGTON, July 29.—Major General John Pope, accompanied by his staff, this morning proceeded to the headquarters in the field. Before breaking up his late headquarters here, General Pope ordered that no passes to the lines of his army should be granted to others than those having official business.
