DETAINED.—The train on the E. & C. R. R. was detained on Saturday evening by the Ohio & Mississippi train being held time, as usual.

The officers of the E. & C. R. R., knowing the great anxiety for news, in a most commendable spirit of accommodation, had the train wait the arrival of the train from Cincinnati, in order to bring through the mails.

A SCRAP OF ROMANCE.—On Friday afternoon a woman, or at least a person in female attire, passed up Locust street carrying a small trunk on her shoulder.

When opposite the Journal office, she stopped and drew forth a plug of tobacco and took a chew, and then proceeded to the railroad depot, but afterwards returned to near the corner of Locust and Sixth street, where she seated herself on the trunk, and there sat till late in the evening, when the attention of the City Marshal was directed to her, and he, after inquiring into her case, provided her lodgings and food.

Her story, that her husband having enlisted in the 25th Michigan regiment, she determined to follow his fortunes, also enlisted in the same regiment, in which she served 22 months without her sex being discovered, or even being recognized by her own husband, who belonged to another company.

Her husband was killed at length and she then revealed her sex, and was discharged from the service, receiving a certificate of her service from Gen. Rosecrans.

Since then, she, for a time, traveled with a panorama of the war through Iowa, in the capacity of lecturer.

She appeared to be possessed of considerable intelligence, and has evidently traveled over a large portion of the United States.

On Saturday a purse was made up to pay her fare to Louisville, to which place she expressed a desire to go.

Many who saw her were impressed with the belief that she was a man in woman's clothing, and such, we must confess, was our own opinion.

The City Marshal, however, believes there was no doubt as to the gender of his protegee, as the voice, hair and general appearance indicated a feminine.

At this time, when spies, deserters, traitors and traitor emissaries are prowling through the country under all conceivable disguises, we believe it would have been proper to have subjected her to a more rigid examination. She said she had been arrested in Cairo on suspicion of being a man, but had satisfied the authorities her story was correct.

It would not be a bad idea for the authorities of Indianapolis, Cincinnati and Louisville to look out for her.
