DAMAGE BY STORM

PAPER BOX FACTORY AT BURLINGTON IS UNROOFED BY THE HEAVY WIND.

Damage to Factory and Property Will Reach \$3,000—Heavy Roofing is Rolled Up by the Wind Like It Was Paper—Hail at Rose Hill.

Burlington, Aug. 6.—The wind and rain storm yesterday wrought great havoc at the Tabor-Burns Company paper box factory on Front street. About 11 o'clock when the rain was coming down in torrents a small cyclone struck the main building and tore the tin roof off the northeast section. The heavy piece of roofing was rolled up like so much tissue paper and hurled against the smokestack on the power plant. This came down with a crash and the big flood of rain poured into the open building for an hour afterwards in torrents. The damage will amount to \$3,000.


