Returns This Afternoon That Estimate Reasonable.

DEMOCRATS IN THE LEGISLATURE

LOCAL DIFFERENCES IN SOME LEGISLATIVE DISTRICTS CAUSE DEFEAT OF REPUBLICAN CANDIDATES FOR REPRESENTATIVE—LIGHT VOTE IN THE CITIES—VOTE IN VICINITY OF OTTUMWA.

Des Moines, Nov. 4.—Returns are coming in very slow but from complete and incomplete ones at hand Cummins' plurality will be reduced from 83,000 two years ago to 59,000.

Lucas County Republican. Chariton, Nov. 4.—(Special.)—Thirteen out of fifteen precincts in Lucas county give republican majorities for all offices but those of sheriff and superintendent of schools.

Hasselquist Elected. Hasselquist lost 250 in Wayne county, the other half of the senatorial district of which Lucas county is a part, but is elected nevertheless.

New County Building. The proposition to build a new county building in Chariton, at a cost of \$25,000, carried by about 200.

Doner Elected at Albia. Albia, Nov. 4.—(Special.)—Big gains were made by the republicans in Monroe county although their efforts to elect William Griffin sheriff were unsuccessful, John Doner (dem.) being elected by about 100 majority.

Mahaska Loses Representative. Oskaloosa, Nov. 4.—(Special.)—Mahaska county republicans lost the representative but elected all the other candidates, except possibly the sheriff.

Keokuk, Nov. 4.—For the first time in several years Lee county went republican yesterday, overcoming a normal democratic lead of 1,200. Every republican county candidate was elected with the exception of one for treasurer.

Van Buren Goes Republican. Keosauqua, Nov. 4.—(Special.)—With a majority of 543 the republican state ticket was elected in Van Buren county yesterday. All of the republican county candidates were elected with varying majorities.

Temperance Element Defeats Wilson. Centerville, Nov. 4.—(Special.)—The temperance element in Appanoose county is held responsible by the republicans for the defeat of J. M. Wilson (rep.) who lost to W. C. McCrary, representing the democratic party and the temperance element, by 31. L. L. Taylor's popularity was the cause of his election on the democratic ticket for senator from the Appanoose-Davis district, by 800.

Muscatine County Strong. Muscatine, Nov. 4.—(Special.)—Muscatine county elected every man on the republican ticket with majorities largely increased over two years ago except that for Governor Cummins, which remains about the same.

Scott County Celebrates. Davenport, Nov. 4.—(Special.)—Scott county is republican by from 500 to 1,000, electing every candidate on the republican ticket. Enthusiastic members of the party last night serenaded the Times with a brass band.

SWEEPING VICTORY

HERRICK DEFEATS JOHNSON BY OVER 125,000 PLURALITY, IN OHIO.

HANNA'S VOTE IS BIG

State Legislature Elected That Will Give Him 95 Plurality on Vote for Senator—Carries Cleveland, Johnson's Stronghold, by Big Lead.

Columbus, O., Nov. 4.—Ohio republicans broke their record yesterday by electing the entire state ticket, giving Myron T. Herrick (rep.) for governor, more than 125,000 plurality over Tom L. Johnson (dem.) and electing republicans to the state legislature that insures a majority of ninety-nine for the re-election of Senator Hanna.

Hanna's Victory Complete. Senator Hanna was first elected to the senate for the term ending March, 1905, by a margin of only one vote after one of the most bitter campaigns ever experienced in Ohio.

Johnson Turned Down in Cleveland. In Cleveland, Johnson's own home, the republicans turned Johnson's former plurality of 6,000 into a Herrick plurality of nearly 10,000.

Returns From Cleveland. Cleveland, O., Nov. 4.—Complete returns from Cuyaga county, including Cleveland, give Herrick (rep.) for governor, 45,169; Johnson, (dem.), 36,469. Herrick's majority is 852.

Republicans Make Gains. Bloomfield, Nov. 4.—(Special.)—Though the democrats elected all the officers except supervisor the republicans have made good gains in Davis county, which has always been republican.

Sullivan Loses Home City. Creston, Nov. 4.—Complete returns of the city give Cummins 774, Sullivan 714, a net democratic gain of 175 over last year. This is Sullivan's home city.

Cummins Carries Henry County. Mt. Pleasant, Nov. 4.—(Special.)—With a majority of 600 the entire republican state ticket headed by A. B. Cummins for governor, carried Henry county over the democratic opponents.

Philadelphians, Nov. 4.—The republicans were generally successful in the city and state yesterday. They carried Philadelphia, electing state treasurer, auditor general and two superior court judges by a majority exceeding 125,000.

Republicans in Bay State. Boston, Nov. 4.—With the exception of a falling off in the socialist vote the election in Massachusetts yesterday very nearly paralleled that of last year.

Van Buren Goes Republican. Keosauqua, Nov. 4.—(Special.)—With a majority of 543 the republican state ticket was elected in Van Buren county yesterday.

Marion Joins the Ranks. Knoxville, Nov. 4.—Governor Cummins and the entire republican ticket were elected in Marion county.

Rhode Island Election. Providence, Nov. 4.—The democrats succeeded in electing Governor Garvin yesterday by 1,000 plurality, but the other state offices went to the republican ticket.

Democracy Wins in Maryland. Baltimore, Nov. 4.—Although complete returns have not been received from any one of the twenty-three Maryland counties, those received indicate that Warfield (dem.) for governor, has a majority.

New Jersey Elections. Trenton, N. J., Nov. 4.—The returns from New Jersey show that the legislature will stand the same as last year, republican 52, and democrats 29.

Beckham Governor of Kentucky. Louisville, Ky., Nov. 4.—The returns received from eighty-three counties, a number of which are incomplete, give Gov. Beckham (dem.) for governor a majority of 26,500.

Utah Democrats. Salt Lake, Nov. 4.—Complete returns show the election of Morris (dem.) as governor, by a majority of 29,000.

Labor Elects Candidate. San Francisco, Nov. 4.—Mayor Schmitz, (union labor candidate), was elected mayor over Crocker (rep.) by over 6,000 plurality.

Montpellier, Ind., Nov. 4.—Grover Goss and Harry Eitzelroch of Marion were burned to death, and Ray Ward of Greenville, Ohio, was fatally burned and Milton Crozier, very seriously injured, in a collision of two cable cars.

SETH LOW DEFEATED FOR MAYOR OF NEW YORK BY GEO. B. McCLELLAN.

FUSIONISTS ARE AMAZED

Tammany Returns to Power With Overwhelming Victory—Devery, Independent Candidate, Retires From Politics—Brooklyn Falls in Line.

MAJORITY VOTE. McClellan 314,900 Low 251,289 Devery 2,935

New York, Nov. 4.—George B. McClellan, (dem.) will be the next mayor of Greater New York, having defeated Mayor Seth Low for re-election by a plurality of 63,611, the complete unofficial returns having been received from every election district in the city.

By the same returns, Comptroller Edward M. Grout and Charles Fornes, president of the board of aldermen, running for re-election on the democratic ticket, though elected two years ago as fusionists, defeated their fusion opponents by 66,790 and 64,973 plurality respectively, Grout leading the city ticket.

Sweeping Victory. This is a sweeping democratic victory, accomplished for the democratic city and borough tickets in four of the five boroughs, only Richmond borough giving Low a plurality and electing fusion officers.

Brooklyn Elects Democrat. J. Edward Swanstrom (fusion), who it was thought last night, might be elected president of the Brooklyn borough, was defeated by Martin W. Littleton, the democratic candidate, by a plurality of 1,219, in spite of Littleton's attitude in opposition to the democratic city ticket.

McClellan's Total Vote. McClellan's total vote for mayor was 314,900 to 251,289 for Low.

Devery is to Quit Politics. Devery, the independent candidate for mayor, polled only 2,935 votes in the entire city.

Former Chief of Police William S. Devery, who ran for mayor as an independent, but secured only a few thousand votes, declared himself to be "out of politics for good."
