THE CANAL TREATY. It is gratifying to American citizens to note the progress that has been made in negotiating a canal treaty with the republic of Panama.

WHAT WILL BE THE RESULT? At the meeting of the Commercial association Friday evening, one of the members present called upon Senator Waterman to state what will be the result if the waterworks franchise should be defeated at the polls on December 3.

Senator Waterman stated that he did not believe the franchise would be defeated. That it had been adopted by the city council after weeks of labor and careful consideration, that the council had incorporated into the franchise practically every recommendation made by a strong non-partisan committee of the Commercial association and that furthermore, this franchise offered to the city the only possible method by which municipal ownership can be secured at any time in the near future.

"If the franchise should fail, however," said Senator Waterman, "I do not see how conditions could be much worse in this city than they will be under those circumstances. The situation will be a deplorable one."
