## NO HAPPY NEW YEAR FOR HIM.




Walter: "Can I wish you many happy returns, sir?"

And knows not what to do.


### A Doubtful Reformation.

Jones—No; the bill collectors don't begin to get around till the 2d.


### Not Likely.
