

FIREMEN'S WAGES HIGH.

Iowa City Laddies Will Receive Twenty-five Cents Per Hour.

The ordinance also provides that a fireman, after five years of faithful service, may retain his uniform. The salary of the chief remains the old figure, \$250 a year and that of the first assistant at \$25.

SHERCLIFFE'S AFFIDAVIT.

Is Said to Show Dennison's Complicity in Crime.

Des Moines, May 31.—The affidavit of Frank Shercliff which was a strong factor in the Dennison requisition matter relates what Dennison told him about coming to Iowa to dig up the stolen diamonds, and is as follows:
"A few days after the robbery I went to the city of Omaha in the state of Nebraska and met one Tom Dennison, who was then a resident of Omaha, Neb., at Seaman's sale barn in the second story thereof; and told him where I had buried the diamonds. Dennison agreed with me that he would go to the place where they were buried and dig them up, and if he succeeded in finding them he would write me at Des Moines, Iowa, care of the Aborn House, O. K."
Says He Received Cash.


"At that time and before he recovered the diamonds, Dennison gave me \$250 in cash and left Des Moines. About the second night after I left Omaha, I received the telegram, O. K. I then went to my home near Melbourne, Iowa, and remained there about two days and then went back to Omaha, and there met Tom Dennison and had a conversation with him in which he told me the following: 'I went to Missouri Valley, on the same train and in the same coach in which the robbery was committed, and went to the place where the diamonds were buried. I had a [redacted] of a time finding those stones. I first tried to get them with a pocket knife and could not find them. I thought they were in the ground deeper. So I went down to a hardware store in Missouri Valley and bought that butcher knife—went back up and struck them the first jab. They were nearer to the surface than I thought they were and I had dug too deep in the first place.'"
Dennison Complained of Haul.

"He then commenced kicking about there being so many small diamonds in the bunch. I asked him if that large one, which was at least six to seven karats, in my judgment, was any good. He said: 'No, it was off color; you must use it for the head of a walking stick or in a dog's collar.'"
"He also said: 'You made a big mistake in talking them out of the package; they were all sorted and paired up. I will have a hard job sorting them and pairing them up for stones for earrings.'"
"I asked him if he found the revolver, and he said: 'I did not find it. I did not look for it.' The revolver referred to, belonged to William C. Pollock, and was in his grip which was also taken by me."


