Most Blue and Red Ribbons At the State Fair of 1904.

The following appeared in one of the Des Moines daily papers during the Iowa State fair:

Mrs. C. D. McPherson of Fairfield, Iowa, has the finest exhibit of horses at the Iowa State fair ground, 1904, having won twenty-one first premiums, six seconds and three thirds. In his exhibit he had seven Percherons, one each of which he received first premium. We have never seen a finer and larger pair of Percheron mares at any horse show in America than his matched pair, Maud and Daisy. They are both blacks, weighing 3,900, not fat but just in good breeding condition. There was a crowd of admirers around the handsome team at all hours in the day. They are very fine actors. Several foot races were tried running against their trotting but no one succeeded in running as fast as the mares could trot. It caused about as much sport as a harness race. The mares are 7 and 8 years old. The 7 year old mare has been shown three successive years and received first premium everywhere exhibited. She is American bred and weighs 2,500 pounds when fat.

His Prince Goodwin, Clydesdale yearling stallion Cosbit of Fairfield, won first prize. He was a first premium colt at Iowa State fair, 1903. He is a low down, heavy built colt. His first premium filly, Keota Maggie, is also a very fine filly.

Mr. McPherson has fourteen fine bred trotting horses. All of them have good size, as well as fine style and conformation.

His brown mare Chick, sired by Chickster No. 6247, was awarded first prize in the Ames college students' contest. There was a fine ring of horses shown in the contest. It was quite interesting to see the class of students examine and mark points. After the decision was given, a fine speech explaining the superior points that Chick possessed was made to the audience by Professor Curtiss of the college class. Chick also won sweepstakes, mare showing best two colts. The colts were sired by Electioneer stallion, J. W. B. 32,333, grandson of Electioneer 125, who has sired 165 standard performers, all trotters, but two.

Mr. McPherson also won sweepstakes in standard bred class stallions showing four best colts. The colts were all handsome seal browns, very fine style, uniform conformation and superior speed. He had five J. W. B. colts on exhibition, and they all received first premiums in their class. It is a record not often made at a state fair.

Mac had five Shetland ponies that the admirers said were the finest ever exhibited at the state fair grounds. The stallion Puzzle is a glossy black, 42 inches high, and weighs 350 pounds. He won first in show ring. His produce also won first. Mac's son Raymond, a 6 year old lad, did the driving in tandem and four-hand. The little lad received many compliments and cheers for his skillful driving and riding. This is his second year in riding and driving. He is said to be the best rider and driver of his age in the state. He drives his ponies to a very fine bicycle speed wagon.

VISIT NEW SCHOOL.

Bloomfield's magnificent \$42,000 building seen by hundreds.

Bloomfield, Sept. 2.—From their till Bloomfield, Sept. 2.—From 3 to 5 Thursday afternoon the new public school building which has been erected at a cost of \$42,000, was open for public inspection. Crowds passed through the handsome building and little children filled the halls and swarmed about like bees excited at the prospect of the pleasant winter to be spent in school rooms so comfortably furnished and supplied with all modern conveniences. The first floor contains seven rooms all having side lighting and each contain a fine wardrobe for hats and wraps. Wide halls upstairs and down extend the length of the building between two tiers of school rooms. In the center of these halls a fountain plays which furnishes the purest water the city affords for drinking purposes. The upper room is divided into seven school rooms and also a large assembly room, library, office and chemical laboratory. The latter is entirely fire proof, the floor, walls and ceiling being finished in cement. Already a fine supply of chemicals and experimental appliances are in order. The basement is not yet finished, but when complete will contain a kindergarten and gymnasium. The immense furnace and its huge machinery was an object of interest to the crowds who thronged through that section of the basement. The fan blast system of furnace heat is being used. The entire interior of the building is finished in oak and presents a very neat appearance. The citizens are entirely satisfied with the building which is one of which the city may well be proud.
