

SECOND RUSSIAN ARMY WILL GO TO MANCHURIA

KUROPATKIN WILL BE VIRTUAL COMMANDER IN CHIEF OF BOTH SIDES.

FIGHTING IN PROGRESS

Important Reconnaissance Conducted By Generals Rennenkampf and Samonoff Result in Sharp Reports With Heavy Casualties.—One Report Says Japanese Were Driven Back.

St. Petersburg, Sept. 19.— Acting upon his military advisers the emperor has decided to form a second Manchurian army. It will be formed of the corps which are being sent to the far east and Lieutenant General Linovitch probably will be given command.

Gen. Kuropatkin will become the chief of both armies but probably without the title of commander in chief but the Associated Press is informed that he will virtually be in complete, untrammelled command.

Fighting is in progress. A dispatch from General Kuropatkin today announces that Generals Rennenkampf and Samonoff are conducting important reconnaissances which have resulted in rather heavy fighting with many casualties.

Rennenkampf Resumes Command. St. Petersburg, Sept. 19.—From Kuropatkin's telegram, which was dispatched yesterday evening, it appears that Rennenkampf has recovered from his wound and has resumed command of his troops.

Japanese Forces Increase. The reconnaissances disclosed a further increase in the Japanese forces at Yental and Bentshapute. The Russians have occupied several villages near the Japanese lines.

Says Japs Were Driven Back. London, Sept. 19.—A dispatch to the News agency from St. Petersburg says the reconnaissances were toward the Japanese front and fight flank, resulting in the Japanese being driven back. The Russian losses, according to this version, are said to be slight.

Japanese Hide Plans Well. Berlin, Sept. 19.—A Lokai Anzeiger Mukden dispatch says: "The Japanese disposition is completely screened behind a line of outposts and it is almost impossible to obtain information from behind this veil. The Russians cannot tell which of four routes the Japanese advance will follow."

Japs Patrol Hun River. Three Japanese companies are patrolling the Hun river in junks. It is reported that Liao Yang is occupied by 2,000 men.

Air Is Poisoned. The air in the vicinity of Liao Yang is being poisoned by exhalations from thousands of unburied bodies. Oyama's headquarters is a short distance north of Liao Yang.

Enormous Ammunition Expenditure. The expenditure of ammunition at Liao Yang was enormous. The Russian artillery on August 31 firing more than 100,000 shots.

Russia's Reply to England. London, Sept. 19.—Russia's reply to the British protest on the subject of Russia's interpretation of contraband of war includes a decision to respect the British demand in the case of the Knight Commander, sunk by the Vladivostok squadron. It is understood that Russia upholds the principle that Admiral Jensen was justified in sinking the steamer. The British government is still hopeful of settlement by means of indemnity.

Russians Are Paroled. Washington, D. C., Sept. 19.— Admiral Goodrich has telegraphed today to the navy department that he has forwarded by mail a full report of the agreement entered into with Captain Berlinky of the Russian vessel Lena, for the parole of the officers and crew of that ship.

Must Stay at San Francisco. This provides for their freedom in the city of San Francisco but they may not go beyond the bounds of the city during the continuance of the present war and under no conditions can they be permitted to return to Russia except upon the conclusion of an agreement on that point between Russia and Japan which would relieve the United States of any responsibility.

Premier Notes Answered. St. Petersburg, Sept. 19.—The Russian answer to the American note in regard to contraband of war has been delivered. It follows generally the lines of the reply to Great Britain. On the broad question involved Russia recognizes the principle of immunity of trade with Japanese ports, but holds to her right to stop contraband destined for the use of Japanese military or naval forces.

DEFY THE LAW

STRIKERS IN ITALY ARE JOINED BY ANARCHISTS.—QUIET IN ROME.

Rome, Sept. 19.—The strike situation is improving here. The workmen shortly after noon decided to abandon the strike and the city has resumed its normal aspects.

Rioting at Palermo and Genoa. At Palermo the strikers and police were in collision during the day. The former displayed a red flag. A disturbance also occurred at Genoa in which anarchists violently participated. The lack of bread led to the outbreak at Genoa.

More Soldiers for Genoa. Strikers at Turin have destroyed a considerable amount of property. Reinforcements of 2,000 troops have been sent to Genoa.

either occurring at the present time or is imminent. This opinion is based on the very heavy bombardment of the Russian stronghold that occurred on September 16, for such a bombardment forms the usual prelude to an assault; on the arrival here of important messengers from Port Arthur, at a time when the running of the blockade is extremely perilous; on a recent authoritative statement that the Japanese siege works are completed, and on reports from Japanese sources that at Dalny an assault was expected to take place in a few days. These reports were received last week.

In addition to the foregoing, there is the common knowledge that the Japanese realize that their continued inactivity increases the resisting power of the Russian garrison, and their consequent desire to make such period of inactivity as brief as possible.

Fresh Meat Supply Exhausted. London, Sept. 19.—The Daily Telegraph's Chee Foo correspondent says: "Two Germans and a Cossack, who have arrived from Port Arthur, assert that General Kuropatkin told Lieutenant General Stoessel that he must hold out until January, and they say that the garrison has ammunition and food for six months. This probably is greatly exaggerated. "Other refugees say that no fresh meat is left at Port Arthur and that the garrison there is reduced to 8,000. "Boys as young as 13 years have been impressed for hospital work. "The destruction of the coast defense vessel Gremlach by striking a mine is confirmed."

DOES IMMENSE BUSINESS. Factory at Atlantic Enjoys a Rush of Prosperity. Atlantic, Sept. 19.—The Atlantic canning factory is doing an immense business at canning corn, running almost continually day and night. The yield of corn is heavy and is of fine quality. The output of the factory averages about 180,000 cans daily and will amount to nearly 6,000,000 cans for the season.

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DOWIE PROMOTES HIMSELF AND IS NOW FIRST APOSTLE

Chicago, Sept. 19.—Garbed in robes of purple, white, scarlet and gold, "the robes of glory given to Moses on the mount," John Alexander Dowie stood before the 8,000 people who crowded into Shiloh tabernacle, Zion City, yesterday, the self-proclaimed messenger of God's covenant, "the prophet of whom Moses spoke," of whom Malachi wrote, and to whom Jesus himself referred, the Elijah of the restoration, first apostle of the Christian Catholic church in Zion, and the restorer "of all things whereof God spoke by the mouth of His holy prophets, which have been since the world began."

Dowie made no formal declaration of the acquisition of his new title of apostle. Throughout the ceremonies which signaled his first appearance in his advanced estate he took it for granted that everybody knew he was the first of the twelve who are to re-establish the succession and continuity of the order. In his paper, Leaves of Healing, printed Saturday, circulated and read by every one of the thousands in Zion, he had told them he was the apostle.

SPANISH WAR HEROES AT ST. LOUIS RECEIVED FROM ROYAL SOCIETY OF STATE HISTORICAL SOCIETY. CHAIRMAN NATIONAL DEMOCRATIC COMMITTEE STARTS ILLINOIS CAMPAIGN. MEETS STATE LEADERS

BISMARCK NAME DIES. Prince Herbert, Last of Noble Line, Ends Fight for Life. Friedrichsruhe, Sept. 19.—Prince Bismarck died Sunday morning. The end was painless.

Since he ceased to be foreign minister on the retirement of his father, in 1890, Prince Herbert Bismarck had taken part in public affairs only as a member of the reichstag. His attitude had been that of a man not appreciated by his sovereign and who was waiting in the background for an opportunity to resume his career.

DOCKS BURN RACE WAR STARTS OVER DICE GAME AND SIX DIE

FIRE AGAIN APPEARS AT HALIFAX, CAUSING A LOSS OF \$200,000. IOWA FIRM FAILS. Cedar Rapids Supply Co. Assigns For Large Amount Today.

Halifax, Sept. 19.—A dock fire which started after midnight and was under control at 3 o'clock, broke out again early today and destroyed several warehouses and other buildings. The warehouses which burned were fine new buildings and the loss is placed at \$200,000.

Big Firms Suffer Loss. At 10 o'clock the fire was still burning but was under control. The firms burned out include Black Bros. & Co.; hardware; Bryant & McDonald, wholesale tea merchants and Thos. Fordham & Co., sailmakers. The insurance is estimated at three-quarters of the loss.

Rumors of Incendiarism. There is a theory that the fire may have been of incendiary origin. The fire continued to burn during the afternoon, but it is being gradually drowned out.

EIGHTEEN LIVES SAVED. Crew of the Barge Pewaumelle Removed From Helpless Vessel. Grand Rapids, Mich., Sept. 19.—Steamer Pentland, bound from Petoskey to Grand Haven, saved eighteen lives in a heavy gale last night. When seventeen miles off Big Point Sauble, the barge Pewaumelle was sighted in a sinking condition and entirely at the mercy of the sea. With much difficulty the crew of eighteen men was taken off and the barge was towed to Ludington.

SEVEN INJURED IN COLLISION. Street Cars in St. Joseph Crash.—One Woman Will Die. St. Joseph, Mo., Sept. 19.—Seven persons were injured in a street car collision here today. Mrs. J. E. Pierpont, of Skidmore, Mo., jumped and sustained a fracture of the skull. She will die. Mrs. J. G. Moody and Mrs. Madge Schuster were seriously hurt. All the injured except Mrs. Pierpont live in St. Joseph.

WELCOME FOREIGN CAPITAL. Japan to Abolish Restrictions on Tenure of Real Estate by Aliens. London, Sept. 19.—The Times' Tokyo correspondent telegraphs: "There is evidence of a strong political movement in Japan in favor of the abolition of all restrictions on the tenure of real estate by aliens and of remodeling the law of mortgage, for the purpose of removing obstacles to the introduction of foreign capital."

TRAIN IS DITCHED. Union Pacific Passenger Train Wrecked Near Kansas City. Kansas City, Sept. 19.—A section of an east bound Union Pacific passenger train in Kansas City at 5 o'clock this afternoon is reported to be wrecked three miles west of Junction City, Kansas. Three sleepers are in the ditch. The wreck was caused by a loose rail. Seven persons are reported injured, none seriously.

SHAW HAS REACHED ILLINOIS. Has Concluded His Stay in Missouri and Will Make An Address. Cairo, Ill., Sept. 19.—Leslie M. Shaw, secretary of the treasury, arrived last night on the way to Harrisburg, Ill., where he will speak this afternoon. Tuesday he will speak at Murphysboro, Ill. Both of these appointments are in Congressman Smith's district.

TRAINS COLLIDE. Twenty People Injured in Accident Near Toledo, None Seriously. Toledo, O., Sept. 19.—Two Cincinnati, Hamilton & Dayton passenger trains making their first trips today over the lines of the terminal company, collided near Ironville and twenty people were injured, none seriously.

MASSACRE OF JEWS IN GERMANY IS REPORTED. Berlin, Sept. 19.—The Russian crusades against the Jews have penetrated to Germany, according to information obtained which details occurrences in Germany rivaling the deeds of the Jew batters in Russia. This information has reached the world by channels similar to that through which came the news of the Kishinev slaughter.

There was a riot at Sasnovitch one week ago it is reported. News of this outbreak evidently has been successfully suppressed by the German officials, the first information concerning it being received recently. How this was accomplished in Germany, where the press enjoys a large measure of freedom, is not understood here.

Blood Flowed in Gutters. Jews were murdered in the streets of Sasnovitch and blood flowed in the gutters like a stream. The dead are over fifty and the wounded, while not known, reach hundreds. More than 100 were left for dead or believed to have been mortally wounded.

Sasnovitch, where the riot is reported to have occurred, is a small city in the province of Prisen in Germany, near the Russian border. The population of the place is made up of Jews, Germans and Russians.

RACE WAR STARTS OVER DICE GAME AND SIX DIE

THREE WHITE MEN AND THREE NEGROES KILLED NEAR CAIRO, ILL.

White Man Is Summarily Executed in Louisiana for Murder and a Negro Is the Victim of a Georgia Mob—Inquiry Begins Today at Huntsville, Alabama.

Carlo, Ill., Sept. 19.—In a quarrel over a game of craps yesterday at Bryans Landing, four miles below here, it is reported six men were killed, three whites and three negroes. A white man who had lost some money in the game, went off and got a party of his friends and returned to the negroes with the demand that the money be given back. They were armed with Winchesters and a fight followed.

Mob Lynches White Man. Alexandria, La., Sept. 19.—John Allison, white, foreman of a track gang, shot and killed Conductor Warren Warren Baldwin at McGeehe station on the Iron Mountain railroad Sunday, and was immediately lynched by the other members of the train crew. A strong effort was made to save the murderer, who pleaded for his life, but the lynchers overpowered those guarding Allison and hung their victim to a tree.

Quarrel Over Ticket. Baldwin and Allison had a dispute about a ticket on the train, and Allison told Baldwin he would kill him, on sight at McGeehe's station. The conductor paid no attention to the threat. While the passengers were alighting from the train Allison shot and almost instantly killed Baldwin.

Mob formed quickly, and before Baldwin was dead a rope was placed around Allison's neck, and he was strung up. The lynching has created great excitement, as he is the first white man to be executed by a mob for the murder of another white man in that section.

Lynch Negro in Georgia. Royston, Ga., Sept. 19.—John Ware, colored, who shot C. Y. Dantel, son of George Danel, near Danielsville, after a quarrel over a trivial matter, Sunday was taken from the officers by a mob between here and Carnesville and lynched. The negro fled after the shooting, but was captured. Hearing that a mob was forming, the sheriff started with Ware to Carnesville, but the mob caught up with the party. The negro's body was riddled with bullets. Dantel, though seriously shot, is still alive.

Inquiry in Huntsville Today. Huntsville, Ala., Sept. 19.—The military court of inquiry appointed by Governor Cunningham convened here today to investigate the conduct of the militia during the recent lynching of the negro, Horace Maples. It is known that several of the persons indicted have left the county.

By reason of the fact that several United States prisoners were in the jail at the time of the attack by the mob, United States secret service men have been sent here to collect evidence against members of the mob.

HARRIS ON TRIAL

MURDER CASE CALLED BEFORE JUDGE C. W. VERMILION THIS AFTERNOON.

From Monday's Daily. The case of the state against John Harris, the colored man charged with the murder of Levi Woods, was called before Judge C. W. Vermilion in the district court this afternoon, and the work of impaneling a jury began. County Attorney Seneca Cornell is conducting the prosecution and B. W. Scott the defense.

Harris was tried before Judge M. A. Roberts at the last term of court and the jury rendered a verdict of manslaughter. The defense was granted a new trial on the grounds of improper questioning of the jurymen. Levi Woods, a farmer residing several miles south of the city, was killed on April 27 by a blow from a club in the hands of Harris. The colored man at once came to Ottumwa to give himself up and claimed that the blow was struck in self defense during a quarrel. There were no witnesses to the affair.

Pleads Not Guilty. Charles Warpet, charged with selling obscene pictures was arraigned before Judge C. W. Vermilion this afternoon and pleaded not guilty.

J. Johnson in custody. Johnson is a banker and promoter of Dallas, Denver and other places. He is under indictment in Denver, with two other brothers, on a financial deal in which they operated in Nebraska, Iowa, Texas, Colorado, Kansas, Louisiana, Mexico and other places.

The two brothers, M. Johnson and M. B. Johnson, are already under arrest. Their exploits amount into the millions.
