ANOTHER FAST TRAIN

GOMEZ DIES AT HAVANA

CUBAN PATRIOT AND WARRIOR PASSES AWAY AFTER A LONG ILLNESS. Havana, Cuba, June 19. — Maximo Gomez is dead. The end came peacefully after a long illness. The general will be given a funeral with national honors.

HELPED MAKE HISTORY RECEIPTS ARE LARGE. Amount Added to Treasury Is \$250,000 Per Day in Excess of the Expenditures—Two Weeks of Fiscal Year Remain.

Life of Famous Fighter. General Maximo Gomez y Baez was one of the famous soldiers of the nineteenth century and probably more loved than any other man aided in the liberation of Cuba. He was born in Santo Domingo in 1826, and received but a meagre education.

Spanish Rule Disgusts. Gomez soon got in touch with the Cuban patriots, and his political views underwent a radical change. He became disgusted with Spanish rule and especially with the cruelty and dishonesty of Vilar, who commanded the army.

Head of Cuban Army. The rebellion was crushed however, and Gomez found it necessary to leave Cuba. He first went to Jamaica and later to his native country, Santo Domingo, where he lived on a farm until 1895, when the second revolution in Cuba broke out.

United States Acts. Cruel reprisals by the Madrid government finally horrified the civilized world and compelled the intervention of the United States to end the war; and when, in 1898, American troops were landed in Cuba, Gomez put his small force at the disposal of the American commanders as speedily as possible.

DEFICIT OF \$23,000,000

UNITED STATES TREASURY WILL SHOW SHORTAGE OF ABOUT THAT SUM. Washington, D. C., June 19. — With less than two weeks of the present fiscal year remaining there is a deficit of \$26,629,025.75 in the treasury.

By many officials and members of congress the condition of the treasury is regarded as the most important matter before the administration and it will undoubtedly be considered so at the next session of the national legislature.
