CHICAGO MARKETS.

Tuesday's Live Stock Market in Brief.
 Tuesday's steer trade little changed, supply small. Half receipts from western ranges, quality plain. Fat kinds wanted, only a few offered. Medium and plain natives slow, demand small. Cows hold Monday's gain under small supply. Cannery and cutters slow sale, bulls steady. Good calves firm early, later market lower. Feeder demand fairly good, prices unchanged. Most heavy packing hogs only steady. Other grades show large advance, top \$8.75. Speculators and shippers main buyers early. Packers take hold slowly, finish weak. Fat sheep slow sale, some 10c lower. Brisk trade in feeders at stronger prices. Western lamb market dull, mostly 10c off. Best natives active, firm, top \$7.85.

Receipts.
 Receipts thus far this week, compared with the same period last week, for all numbers increased 1,700 cattle, decreased 8,900 hogs and increased 10,000 sheep. Compared with same period last year cattle decreased 4,200, hogs 200 and sheep increased 24,100. HORSE TRADE SLOW.

Receipts Lighter Than Week Ago, With No Gain in Demand.
 Chicago, Aug. 15.—The low level of prices reported last week gives no indication of improvement. The mildness of the weather is emphasized by the slowness in which the early receipts of the week are clearing. Dealers were hopeful that the late decline would be only a temporary fluctuation of the market, and that the current week would witness a rally, but the opening days of the week have shown no betterment in demand or prices. Initial receipts Monday and Tuesday are around 200 arrivals below the run for the corresponding last week, but fewer offerings fail to stimulate the tone of trade. General prices for intermediate classes are down \$5@15 and around \$5@10 on the good to choice kinds, with the general movement slow at the decline. A few arrivals clear at fair values, but the bulk of the receipts are changing hands at the following prices:
