STEEPS GO LOWER.
Stock Yards, Chicago, March 4.—Weakened shipping and packer demand coupled with liberal Thursday cattle supplies of 9,000, effected a reaction of 10¢ to 15¢ from Wednesday's high prices. Medium quality steers were hardest hit, though there were numerous weighty grades, costing around \$7.00-7.25, which showed full extent of the decline. Choice kinds, however, sold steady, and a new top for the year was made at \$8.25 for a load of 1,494-lb Angus heaves. Next highest sale was \$7.75, while only a short quota went above \$7.25. In spite of the decline prices were still on a basis 15¢ to 20¢ higher than a week ago, and the trade looked upon the Thursday break at only an incident which will be eliminated in the market next week. Outlook for next week favors only moderate receipts, since the feeling in corn belt feeding sections is averse to liquidating half fat steers now, following recent sharp price advances for all grades. Butcher stock prices suffered a decline of 10¢ to 15¢ from Wednesday levels, in sympathy with steers, although sales were still 10¢ to 15¢ higher than a week ago. Packers took the big end of the crop and were bearish toward the medium grades, but bought freely of fat cows and heifers, paying \$4.75 to \$5 for these. Bulls, too, went weak to lower, but calves held Wednesday's basis, bulk making \$9.25 to \$9.75. Feeding cattle also sold at full Saturday prices on active country demand. Many lots

cleared at \$5.50 to \$6.00, and a few choice heavy feeders landed up to \$6.20. Prices had the following range: Choice to fancy steers \$7.35 to \$8.25; Medium to fat steers \$5.00 to \$6.00; Fat cows and heifers \$4.15 to \$6.40; Canning cows and heifers \$2.65 to \$4.00; Nights bulbers and stags \$3.50 to \$5.54; Feeding cattle \$6.00 to \$100 lbs 4.00 to \$6.20; Fair to fancy veal calves \$8.00 to \$9.90; Heavy calves \$3.50 to \$5.25; Export steers \$6.10 to \$6.90; Distillery steers \$4.00 to \$5.00; Milkers and springers head \$5.00 to \$6.50.

Chicago Stock Yard Personal.
Stock Yards, Chicago, March 4.—Robert Lee, a big feeder of Muscatine, Ia., marketed 36 branded beef steers averaging 1475 lbs at \$7.90 on the Wednesday market. Mr. Lee is a large land owner of Muscatine, Ia. E. R. Thompson, a big feeder of Kingsley, Iowa, marketed one car load of 307-lb hogs on yesterday's market which sold at \$9.95. He says there are only short supplies of hogs in that section at present and also a light volume of steers on feed. A. R. Bixler of Clarence, Iowa, marketed Wednesday 18 head of 1348-lb steers at \$7.10. J. H. Reinners, Wyoming Iowa market yesterday 17 steers of his own feeding which averaged 1306 lbs and sold at \$7.00. L. H. Hollie of Hartley, Iowa, bought own feeding which sold at \$7.75, averaging 1033 lbs. A. O'Brien of Pottawattamie county, Ia., marketed 36 branded beef steers averaging 1475 lbs at \$7.90 on the Wednesday market. Bahne Hansen of Charlotte, Iowa, had a load of steers of his own feeding on Wednesday's market which sold at \$7.55, averaging 1371 lbs. E. S. Marsh, a prominent stockman of Odebolt, Iowa, sold 12 head of 900-lb yearling steers and heifers Wednesday at \$7.00 and the balance of the load, cows, at \$5.40. H. B. Weip, an enterprising young feeder of Heverhill, Iowa, was on Wednesday's market with two cars of delayed cattle and hogs. He reports a big scarcity of fat stock in his vicinity this winter. Joe Dues of Roland, Iowa, was on Wednesday's market with two loads of cattle and two of hogs. He is the "old boy" and has been in the business of buying and shipping live stock ever since he was a boy in his teens.
