Marshalltown, March 15.—Marshall Lodge No. 322 B. P. O. E. is planning for an elaborate dedication of the new Elks' home on East Main street, between Second and Third streets, and the date has not yet been fixed, the ceremonies will likely be held some time next month.

MANCHESTER TO USE MACADAM

Hundred and Fifty Car Loads of Crushed Rock Ordered for Use on Streets of the City. Manchester, March 15.—Manchester's streets are to be materially benefited during the coming summer, as the city fathers have taken it upon themselves to order 150 cars of crushed rock, which will be used in the macadamizing process, which will be carried on most extensively on Franklin street, one of the main thoroughfares, and which has been in a bad condition for the past number of years. During last week J. L. Kelsey, traffic manager of the Chicago, Anamosa and Northern railway of Anamosa, placed an order with the Illinois Central agent at Coggon for 150 empty freight cars, which will be used in transporting the rock from the quarries at Anamosa to Coggon, and then to Manchester via the Illinois Central.
