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
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

KILLED BY PLAYMATE
John Reibe, 14 Years of Age, Accidently Shot by Companion—Fall by Boy Carrying Gun Caused Fatal Accident.
Garner, April 9.—A tragedy which has stirred the whole town happened when John Reibe, a 14-year-old boy, was shot and instantly killed by the accidental discharge of a rifle in the hands of a playmate.

Reibe was pushing a wheelbarrow when the other boy, who was carrying the rifle, stumbled in some manner. The gun was discharged, the bullet entering Reibe's head at the right temple, causing his instant death. It was not known to either boy that the gun was loaded.

The test showed that but eighteen ears out of 850 were fit to use for seed, making but 5 per cent strong, vigorous ears to the hundred.
Free Text Books for Drake Students.
Des Moines, April 9.—According to announcement made by President Bell of Drake university this morning text books for all classes and all departments will be furnished students free of charge next year.
The new system will be a great saving to students, as some of the books, especially in the professional schools, have been very expensive.
However, there is to be a general raise in the price of tuition in all departments. On the other hand all fees, such as library, medical and athletic, will be discontinued. The change will in the long run make the cost of gaining an education at the local school cheaper.
Sioux City Gets Money For Park.
Sioux City, April 9.—E. P. Farr, the defeated candidate for mayor of Sioux City at the last election today turned over to the city warrants for \$720, which had been issued to him as payment for three years' service as park commissioners. Farr desires that the money returned be used as the nucleus of a fund to purchase ground for a park to be placed in a portion of the city easily accessible to the poor people.
