### Wages and Hours Shortened.

wages have been considerably increased and the hours shortened. He stated that labor has three fields of endeavor, industrial, political and in using its purchasing power as a lever toward the betterment of conditions of the workers. He stated that the organization might gain higher wages and shorter hours. In the political field the labor vote if properly utilized would result in the condition of the worker being improved, making work more sanitary and less hazardous. Mr. Perrin declared that the high price of living was not because the workers were spending their money for luxuries but because of the present system of finance which removes the producer and the consumer farther and farther apart with each move and increase the selling price of the article. He arraigned the beef trust, and made some rather strong accusations regarding the legality of the combine.

### Hobby Tells of Movement.

At the conclusion of Mr. Perrin's talk, Carna Turner, president of the Ottumwa Trades and Labor assembly, introduced Mr. Hobby of the Hotel and Restaurant Employees. Mr. Hobby in opening made a short apology stating that he did not know that he was called up at the hotel and told to come up and deliver a short talk. He stated that he had not been prepared for an address but would endeavor to give a few facts on the labor movement. He told of the great labor movement in this country and how the labor unions had not only been of great benefit to the union man in the way of more wages and shorter hours, but to the man outside of the union who has received like benefits. He urged the union men to take greater interest in their organization and work to get the non-union members of their craft into the fold. He spoke of the growth of the labor movement and continued that it was growing rapidly and did not believe the time was many years off when the labor movement would be made up of ninety to ninety-five per cent of the working men and women. Mr. Hobby told of the great good accomplished by the wages and shorter hours not only in the working people. He urged his hearers to purchase articles bearing the union label and in that way they would promote unionism. In conclusion he spoke of the growth of his organization and other crafts and how to make the union stronger and greater.

### Attendance is Small.

The attendance at last night's meeting was small, not being nearly so large as on the previous night, but those present heard two excellent talks. Miss Clara Mitchell gave several pretty selections on the piano. Rev. F. J. Adian of the Swedish Methodist Episcopal church, offered the lecture in occasion. His prayer asked for the success of the labor movement and that the working people take a greater interest in Christianity.

He delivered an interesting talk on the labor movement.

Mr. Olivey was booked for an address earlier in the revival but was unable to reach the city. President A. L. Urlick of the State Federation of Labor secured him for tonight. The Ottumwa local of the United Garment Workers of America will attend the meeting in a body and it is expected to make this meeting the best of the revival, as it is the concluding number of the ten days' rally. Both men are well versed in the labor movement and they will give addresses which will be of great interest to every union man and woman in Ottumwa.
