STRANGER HELD UP AND ROBBED

HUGH EMERY OF FREMONT, NEB., VICTIM OF DAYLIGHT ROBBERY—BERRY SUSPECTED

Persuaded by a newly made friend to take a walk across the Wapello street bridge, Hugh Emery, a young farmer residing at Fremont, Neb., was the victim of a daylight holdup yesterday and robbed of \$70 and a gold watch. The holdup occurred about 11 o'clock according to Emery's story, who appeared at the police station about 4 o'clock in the afternoon and reported the robbery to Chief Gallagher. After crossing the bridge Emery stated that he was hit over the head by his unknown friend and his money taken from him. He declared that he was knocked unconscious from the blow and did not recover from the stupor until late in the afternoon.

Emery said he had come to the city Thursday night looking for work and had been drinking heavily. While in a saloon yesterday drinking with his newly made acquaintance, the latter suggested that they go for a walk, to crossing the bridge and reaching a secluded spot, his friend turned upon him and robbed him of all his money and jewelry. Emery had not recovered from the stupor when he reached the police station. His story was disconnected. Bruises on his head and a flesh wound on the forehead showed that he had been roughly treated.

BATAVIA MAN IS ACQUITTED

JOHN CLARK, CHARGED WITH MAKING AWAY WITH CATTLE, NOT GUILTY.

Fairfield, April 9.—(Special)—John Clark of Batavia was acquitted of larceny late Thursday afternoon after the jury had considered the case for nearly 22 hours. It was charged that three years ago Clark made away with 16 head of cattle. The case was tried here two years ago, and a conviction secured, but the supreme court returned it for re-trial. The trial attracted big crowds because of the prominence of Clark and the sensational features of the case. It is understood that for many hours the jury stood 8 to 4 in favor of conviction, but asked for additional instructions from the court, which practically assured acquittal for Clark.
