NEWS GATHERING ASSOCIATION HAS ANNUAL MEETING IN NEW YORK.

New York, April 28.—The board of directors of the Associated Press today elected Frank B. Noyes of the Washington, D. C. Star as president; R. M. Johnstone of the Houston, Texas, Post, as first vice-president; Frank P. MacLennan, of the Topeka, Kas., State Journal, as second vice-president; Melville E. Stone, a secretary; Charles S. Johnson, an assistant secretary and R. Yonatt, treasurer. Also as members of the executive committee, Victor F. Lawson of the Chicago Daily News, Frank B. Noyes of the Washington Evening Star, Charles W. Knapp of the St. Louis Republic, Adolph S. Ochs of the New York Times, and General Charles H. Taylor of the Boston Globe.

After the reading of the various committee reports, elections were held to fill the seven vacancies in the board of directors. The voting resulted in the election of the following: Clark Howell, Atlanta, Journal Constitution; Charles Knapp, St. Louis Republic; V. S. McClatchy, Sacramento Bee; Albert J. Barr, Pittsburg Post; Charles Hopkins Clark, Hartford Courant; Frank B. Noyes, Washington Star and A. C. Weiss, Duluth Herald.
