ACCESSION OF KING GEORGE V. IS ANNOUNCED

mer hall under the house of parliament, which was last the scene of a similar ceremony when for two days and nights a constant stream of citizens filed past the coffin of the great commoner, Gladstone.

Before being taken to Westminster the body will lie in state in the throne room at Buckingham palace. King Edward's casket will be fashioned out of oak grown in the royal forest at Windsor. It will first be lowered to the vault beneath the chapel floor of St. George chapel, Windsor castle. Afterward when the permanent tomb has been prepared, it will be removed to Albert chapel.

An impressive incident Sunday afternoon illustrated Queen Alexandra's desire to show consideration for the British subjects of every class. General Booth sent a message that the Salvation Army wished to show honor to Edward VII. by holding a service before the palace and Alexandra gave permission. At 4 o'clock a large band wearing red jerseys and carrying silver instruments and banners with scarfs of crepe pushed through the crowd to the palace enclosure. The big iron gates were opened and the band formed a circle under the windows.

her first home in London, for she was brought here as a bride in 1863. It was suggested that Sandringham house may be used by the queen mother.

In all probability the queen mother will spend a portion of each year in her native Denmark. In 1907 she built a summer residence on Klampenborg bay, seven miles from Copenhagen which during the last two summers she shared with her sister, the Dowager Empress of Russia. These sisters always have been deeply attached to each other, and they probably will spend a great deal more time together in the future.

Marlborough house was used as the dowry house in 1837 when it was settled by an act of parliament, on Queen Adelaide, widow of William IV., for life. Marlborough house is 200 years old. It was built by Sir Christopher Wren. It did not become the property of the crown until 1817, when it was given to Princess Charlotte, only child of George IV.

The princess, who died in childbirth at Claremont during that year, never lived there. It was occupied for several years by her widower, Prince Leopold, before he became king of the Belgians.
