SHERIFF SAID HE WILL STANDPAT

MEMBER OF LAW AND ORDER LEAGUE SAYS CEDAR RAPIDS AFFAIR WILL BE AIRED.

"Just tell the people for me that I am unapproachable, and will stand pat," said Sheriff W. W. Jackson this morning when asked his position in the matter of acceding to the demand made upon him by the Law and Order League for his resignation. "You can just make the statement for me that I am unapproachable and have attorneys in charge of my case. I am going to stand pat. My position is not changed from what it was yesterday when I told you that I would fight the case."

A member prominent in the Law and Order League stated that proceedings will be instituted immediately with the attorney general, looking toward the ousting of the sheriff from office. "Sheriff Jackson," said he, "tendered his resignation to the league committee yesterday, but apparently had another thought overnight and withdrew the proffered resignation this morning. The league has seven affidavits to file with the attorney general. The names of the parties making the affidavits I do not at present care to mention. Suffice to say, however, that the Cedar Rapids affair will be one of the items of interest brought out in the case of the league against Sheriff Jackson."

"The filing of the affidavits with the governor will bring the case into the hands of the attorney general, who will prosecute the case in person, choosing his own judge. The case will be heard in Wapello county."

THIEVES TAKE MILK FROM COWS

UNIQUE COMPLAINT IS MADE TO THE POLICE—WILL PROSECUTE OFFENDERS.

While many unique complaints come to the police of various crimes, the one which takes the cake for being uncommon was the one which reached the police station this morning. Owners of cows which are kept in the Garfield park pasture complain that some one is stealing the milk from the animals in the morning before they reach the scene. One proprietor went to the pasture this morning, walking nearly one-half mile and when he got there he only received about one quart of milk. It appears that the milk thieves get busy during the early morning hours as the same cows give the regular quantity of milk at night time.

The crime is that of petit larceny and the police will attempt to stop the offenders and if they are caught they will be prosecuted to the full extent of the law. The crime is the same as stealing any other articles. The owners of the cows are very wrathful and are determined to stop the practice.

There were three offenders in police court this morning. Mrs. Yates charged with intoxication pleaded not guilty and will have her hearing tomorrow morning. Charles Hayes also entered a plea of not guilty of vagrancy and his trial was set for tomorrow. Manuel Devoil was the other offender and he pleaded guilty to intoxication and was given three days on the rock pile.

THINK DETECTIVES ROBBERS.

Chicago, May 18.—Three coal miners, who had just arrived in Chicago from Dwanon, Ill., mistook four detectives for robbers early today and fled. The officers gave chase and each fired a shot killing one man instantly and severely wounding another. The individual killed was John Dubinski. His wounded companion was Michael Ventor. The third, Michael Dubinski, a brother of the man slain, was arrested.

REPUBLICANS PREPARING TO WAGE A FIGHT

making a personal speaking campaign. Guy Feely, speaker of the House of Representatives in the last Iowa General Assembly, has developed a strong following. He is making a statewide canvass and is receiving favorable mention everywhere. Mr. Feely's candidacy was given quite a boost by the withdrawal from the race in his favor by Joseph R. Fralley of Fort Madison, who was looked upon for a time as a possible strong candidate, and who has been helping Mr. Feely in his campaign. Geo. Cosson of Audubon, admits he expects little support from the river and liberal districts where his law enforcement laws were not popularly received, but contends he will have strength sufficient in other counties to overcome this loss.

Union Labor in Field. Candidates for the two nominations to be made for the office of railroad commissioner supply the largest flock in the field, and an interesting one. Colonel D. J. Palmer of Washington county, present chairman of the board, and a member for several years, who has been conceded one of the nominations because of his valuable experience on the board, his wide acquaintance as a farmer, and his remarkable record as a soldier, this week added another feather to his cap when the Iowa Unionist, the official publication of Union labor in Des Moines, officially endorsed him, stating that it is found "that Colonel Palmer has always aligned himself with the interests of the people from the time he enlisted in the army to preserve the Union up to the present time." James Wilson of Adair county has also been endorsed by this union labor organ. Mr. Wilson is said to be making considerable gain. Other active candidates are Earl Ferguson of Shenandoah, C. Ottosen of Ottosen, Edward Seltz of Peterson and Clifford Throne of Washington county.

In the contest for republican nomination for clerk of the supreme court L. Garrett, the progressive candidate is conducting a lively campaign systematically over the entire state. H. L. Bosquet of Knoxville, the present incumbent who is filling out the unexpired term of John Crockett who resigned, has developed remarkable strength that promises to withstand the double attack being made by two opposing candidates.

For the superintendency of public instruction the republican primary presents a puzzle. Politics can be learned, as being mentioned by one of the seven candidates and each one is making his fight along lines of personal following and educational qualifications. The candidates are: A. L. Heminger of Keosauqua; Adam Pickett of Creston, J. F. Riggs of Sigourney, F. E. Larke of Monroe, A. K. Deyoe of Garner and I. C. Welty of Story county are those who seem to be leading in the fight.

EARTH THROUGH TAIL OF COMET THIS EVENING.

(Continued From Page 1.) molecules are present in the tails, the proportion of solid particles to gas molecules varying in different comets. "It seems to be a conservative estimate that there is not more than one particle of solid material, microscopic in size, on the average cubic yard. The earth's atmosphere will form a perfect protecting blanket against all possible constituents of the tail. There is absolutely no cause for anxiety as to any injurious effects upon terrestrial life, animal or vegetable."

Work at Yerkes Observatory. Prof. J. A. Parkhurst will be in charge of the observations made at Yerkes observatory tonight. Every preparation has been made for the most complete and exhaustive study of the comet. Several instruments have been set out on the explanade so that the scientists will be able to command

an unrestricted view of the entire heavens.

"If it were not for the fact that we will have a full moon in the sky, we should be able to see a strong aurora," said Prof. Barnard of Yerkes observatory yesterday. "As it is we will be handicapped by a strong moonlight if the sky is clear."

"It is possible that we have a meteoric shower, although it is not probable. If it does occur we will be prepared for it, and we'll be ready to photograph the meteors."
