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## CARROLL IS RENOMINATED FOR GOVERNOR

HEADQUARTERS CLAIM 15,000 BUT OPPONENTS CLAIM THIS WILL BE CUT DOWN; GARST STILL MAKES CLAIMS.

## SMITH BEATS BYERS; PROUTY DOWNS HULL

IN THE FIRST DISTRICT KENNEDY IS RENOMINATED AND IN THE EIGHTH TOWNER IS WINNER—OTHER RACES CLOSE.

Des Moines, June 8.—3 p. m.—Incomplete returns from 67 counties indicate Carroll's nomination by 12,000. The Register and Leader now says the returns indicate Carroll's nomination.

Des Moines, June 8.—1 p. m.—The Register and Leader, progressive, declares Garst's nomination is a certainty by 6,000. Neither Gov. Carroll nor the Daily Capital admit Carroll's defeat. Returns from 56 counties give Garst a lead of 4,000 over Carroll.

C. C. Nye, Carroll's private secretary, claims Carroll is nominated by 10,000 on returns from forty-five counties.

Des Moines, June 8.—While returns from yesterday's primaries are still incomplete the nomination of Carroll, Republican, and Porter, Democrat, for governor, seems certain. Eight progressives and three standpaters were nominated for congress.

Complete unofficial returns from the seventh district give Prouty 1,100 over Hull. Two years ago Hull was nominated by forty votes. Smith's majority in the ninth is 2,000 over Byers.  
Governor Carroll's headquarters are still claiming his election by 15,000 and Garst's headquarters claim Garst's election by 5,000. The returns are coming in and the News, with returns from forty-five counties have figures indicating whoever wins will not have over two or three thousand majority. Complete returns from the seventh district show Prouty, progressive, carried every county. The state convention will be progressive and endorse Dolliver and Cummins. The Democratic vote in the state is light, but Porter is probably the nominee for governor.  
Reports from the second district state that Irvin Pepper defeated J. A. De Armand for the Democratic nomination for congress by 300 majority.  
The latest returns in the district gives Towner 1,000 majority.

**What the Des Moines Papers Say.**  
Des Moines, June 8.—(Special)—In the morning extras the News claims Garst's nomination by 20,000 and the Capital says Carroll has won by 15,000, while the Register and Leader, while claiming Garst's nomination, admits the question is in doubt. It will probably take the full returns to show who will be nominee for governor on the Republican ticket. Claude Porter appears to have defeated S. H. Bashor of Waterloo for the Democratic nomination with E. G. Moon of Ottumwa as third. For attorney general it is a close race between Cosson of Audubon and Feely of Waterloo. In the seventh district S. F. Prouty, progressive, was nominated by 2,000 over Hull. The Capital admits Hull's defeat by 700 and the News claims 2,500. Prouty carried Polk by 900, Dallas by 200, Marion by 100, Story by 900, and Warren by 350, while Hull carried only one county, Madison, by 200. The News admits the defeat of Byers, progressive, by Smith, for congress in

## Regulars at Washington Are Pleased

Washington, June 8.—The early report of the Republican victory of Governor Carroll, the standpat candidate for governor in the Iowa primaries and of the two regular Republican candidates for congress, Smith and Kennedy, against whom the "insurgents" under Cummins, made the strongest fight, caused jubilation among the organization Republicans here today. Smith is one of Speaker Cannon's staunchest supporters. The defeat of Hull in the seventh district means that the next congress will see a new chairman of the house committee on military affairs.

**CUMMINS GIVES VIEWS.**  
Chicago, June 8.—Senator Cummins of Iowa, who was here today, sees a great victory for the "progressive" Republicans in the Iowa primaries yesterday. He declared the defeat of Congressman Hull the "standpat" Republican candidate in the seventh district, overshadowed all other issues in political significance. He said he believed Garst would be chosen as the candidate for governor.

## WISCONSIN REPUBLICANS IN SESSION

**FIGHT BETWEEN LAFOLLETTE AND "STALWART" ELEMENTS OF PARTY IN THAT STATE MAY BE DECIDED IN CONVENTION.**

Milwaukee, Wis., June 8.—The Republicans met this afternoon for the purpose of ascertaining the general party sentiment toward the present national administration by the adoption of a platform and to consider the advisability of recommending or endorsing candidates for state offices to be voted for at the September primaries.

Among the delegates are many former followers of Senator LaFollette, but the majority are adherents of the so-called "stalwarts." The party convention will be addressed by Vice President Sherman and former Congressman Watson of Indiana.  
Michael E. Dillon of Ashland is temporary presiding officer. Speaker Bancroft of Richland Center is slated for permanent chairman.  
A fight at LaFollette.  
Temporary Chairman Dillon, addressing the Republican convention, urged harmony in party, both state and national, and declared the party would be wrecked unless it was placed above the ambition of the individual. He held the men elected to office upon a party platform were in duty bound to aid the party leaders to carry out the platform promises and that when these beneficiaries of the party raise the black flag of politics they should be allowed to sail under the banner of any political organization. The speaker paid a warm tribute to Taft and declared he was in favor of the administration program.

the ninth district by 1,000, and the Capital claims that Smith has 2,500 majority over his progressive opponent. The Register and Leader admits Smith's victory by 1,000 and says he won because of local pride in his possible selection to the speakership. The progressives say they will control the next state convention and will endorse Cummins and Dolliver, and this appears likely. No estimates can be secured of the make-up of the legislature, but it will be progressive. In the eighth district it looks as though Towner, standpat, has defeated Darrah, progressive, for the nomination to congress.

**Lucas County.**  
Chariton, June 8.—(Special)—The complete vote of Lucas county gives Carroll 813 and Garst 663. On the Democratic ticket Porter got 242, Moon 61 and Bashor 42. Cosson lead for attorney general with 795; Feely was second with 290 and Chantland got 206. Darrah for congress got 1,034 and Towner 414. Stuart, Democratic candidate for congress, had 263 votes to his opponent's 70. The progressives control the convention.

**Davis County.**  
Bloomfield, June 8.—(Special)—With all but one Davis county precinct heard from, Carroll has a vote of 742 and Carst 63. This is Governor Carroll's home county. The Democratic ticket nominated includes J. K. Krewson for auditor, U. G. Johnson for

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## YOUNG HARDY MAKES EFFORT TO END LIFE

IOWA YOUTH SUSPECTED OF SLAYING PARENTS AND YOUNG BROTHER BUTTS HIS HEAD AGAINST CELL; FORGED A NOTE

Marshalltown, June 8.—Raymond Hardy, the 19-year-old boy, who is being held on suspicion of having murdered his parents and brother, attempted suicide last night by butting his head against the prison walls. His nose was broken and his head was badly bruised. The funeral of the murdered people took place this afternoon.

Developments of the last twelve hours have strengthened the professed belief of the sheriff's officers and County Attorney Eggermeyer that Raymond Hardy is guilty of the murder Sunday night of his father and mother, James Hardy and his wife, and his brother Earl, near VanCleave. They assert that the crime was part of a plan to get money to enable Raymond to wed.  
To the sheriff and to the county attorney young Hardy told conflicting stories about incidents of the day before the murder and the night the triple crime is supposed to have been committed. For three hours the county attorney examined Hardy in his cell. The prisoner declared over and over again that he was innocent, but changed minor points in his story on repeating it.

The sheriff claims to have proof that is all but positive that young Hardy's story of finding a saddled and bridled horse in the barn at his father's home Sunday morning is untrue. The saddle he said was on the horse was found in the barn, but it was covered with dust and evidently had not been touched recently.

The only motive those who accuse Hardy of the murders have considered is that he sought to become the sole heir to the live stock, machinery and other property on his parents' farm. The young man is said to have admitted that he had little money and no prospects of any more on his wedding day, which was to have been today. His accusers assert that if he is guilty the crime was planned with a view to securing means to start housekeeping.

A note of sale for \$1,000, dated Nov. 1, 1909, and purporting to be given to Raymond Hardy by his father and brother Earl was found yesterday. Raymond admitted that it was a forgery. He said he had drawn and signed it "just for fun" and had no idea of ever using it.

**Stories at Variance.**  
Young Hardy told conflicting stories as to how a gray hat he wore Sunday night when he went to call on his fiancée became spattered with blood. He first said that he hung the hat on the south wall of the room in which his mother's body was found. That part of the wall has no hooks or nails on it. Later he said that he hung it on the east wall over the head of the sofa on which his mother lay dead, and which was splattered with blood. The head of the sofa, examination showed, was two feet from the east wall. The young man said the hat must have fallen down on the blood-stained sofa.

Residents of the neighborhood of Van Cleave still insist Hardy is innocent.

Hardy asserted that there had been no real objection by his parents to his intended marriage, although they had wanted him to wait until he was older.

**Muet Protect Mines.**  
Danville, Ill., June 8.—A temporary injunction restraining the United Mine Workers from interfering with the maintenance of work in the coal mines of Jackson and Williamson counties was issued today by Federal Judge Wright. The pump and engine men will return to work at once, pending the final decision in the case.

**Pastor Found Dead on Train.**  
Toledo, O., June 8.—Rev. C. A. Hallberg, aged 49 years, pastor of a Swedish Lutheran church at Sheffield, Pa., was found dead early yesterday. He had complained of illness an hour previous.

**King and Queen at Calatri.**  
Avellino, Italy, June 8.—King Victor Emanuel and Queen Helena spent today amidst the desolation of Calatri, ministering to their afflicted subjects. The town is practically a heap of ruins.

**Select Browne Jury.**  
Chicago, June 8.—The selection of a jury to try Browne on the allegation of bribery progressed today. At noon four jurors were accepted by both sides.

**Won't Remove Troops.**  
Washington, June 8.—The president today refused to accede to the demand of the citizens of Seattle, Washington, for the removal of the 25th infantry, colored, because a soldier is accused of assaulting a white woman.

## TICKET NAMED BY DEMOCRATS IN THE COUNTY

CONVENTION MUST NAME CANDIDATES FOR SEVERAL OFFICES—VOTE ON ALL WAS CLOSE.

The Democratic primary was farther off than the Republican in its mission of making nominations for county offices, several of the aspiring politicians being forced to go to the convention in order to have their names appear on the ballot next November. Judge E. G. Moon carried Wapello county by a good margin, and C. E. Walters ran away ahead of C. H. Amos for the nomination of attorney general. John F. Webber defeated Dr. C. A. Henry in the senatorial race by an overwhelming majority, carrying almost every precinct in the county. Upon the returns of the fourth ward, which had not been received late this afternoon, depends the choice for county clerk, George Phillips and Charles Deeds running neck and neck. Deputy Sheriff William Knox defeated the field of candidates for the sheriff's office with apparent ease, and L. E. Cawley had a walk-away vote for the other candidates for the nomination of recorder. Daniel Steck won out for the office of county attorney over L. C. Hendershott and E. R. Mitchell. In the township offices for Center township, an extremely close race was run by Fred Wilcox, William Payne and Steve Barnes, the first two names securing the most votes. J. M. Huffman and M. W. JUMPS INTO MISSISSIPPI LEAVING NOTE TO HER LOVER NOTIFYING HIM



She drowned before help could reach her. The act was the result of a lover's quarrel and the girl left a note on the bridge which read as follows: "Dear Fred—I thought so much of you I would die."  
The bridgekeeper sold the girl her ticket a few minutes before she jumped in the river. The body has not been recovered.


## Iowa Executive Who Claims He Has Been Renominated at Primary

Governor Carroll's friends continued to claim a victory for him all during the day, although the Garst managers claimed at different times during the day that the progressive candidate would win. Late returns this afternoon indicate Carroll's renomination by a good majority, although not as big as two years ago.

It was not until late this afternoon that Garst's friends would admit his defeat. The delay in the counting of the vote over the state led to indecision in arriving at a reliable conclusion. The two men were candidates at the primary two years ago and this year Garst cut down Carroll's majority considerably.

## THIS COUNTY GIVES CARROLL LEAD OF 1240

GOVERNOR CARRIES EVERY PRECINCT IN WAPELLO OVER GARST, INCREASING LEAD OF TWO YEARS AGO.

## CREMER IS SHERIFF; WHITMORE SENATOR

RACE FOR COUNTY RECORDER SO CLOSE IT WILL GO TO CONVENTION; HOT RACE ON THE TOWNSHIP TICKET.

Gov. B. F. Carroll, who two years ago defeated Warren Garst by 989 votes in Wapello county, yesterday increased his majority to 1,240, carrying every precinct in Wapello county. For attorney general, Chantland ran ahead of Cosson and Feely. For superintendent Riggs and Heminger made a close race. Palmer and Wilson led the other candidates for railroad commissioner. Chester Whitmore defeated L. H. Young for state senator. Congressman Kendall was not opposed and received a large complimentary vote.

**The County Ticket.**  
Former Sheriff Harry Cremer was renominated for sheriff by a big plurality over his opponents. A. W. Roberts of Eldon was nominated for auditor for the term beginning 1911 and J. R. Stodghill defeated A. J. Fairchild, the present incumbent, for the term beginning 1912. The race between Recorder Swenson and Mrs. Elizabeth Llewellyn was so close that it will go into the convention.  
The standpaters will control the county convention which will select delegates to the state convention. No advice has been received as to whether the standpaters or progressives will control the state convention owing to the delay in receiving returns.
