Butcher stock had another 10@15c break, grassy cows and heifers showing 50@65c decline from best levels of last week. Big end of the crop went at \$4.40@5.15, and packers were chief operators. Bulls declined 10@20c, biologians being off 30@50c from last week, few going above \$4.75. Calves were kept in demand at prices 25c higher than last Tuesday and firm with Monday. Bulk of vealers sold at \$3.75@3.95. Feeder cattle, in moderate supply, moved slowly at \$7.60.

HOG AVERAGE 7C UP. Light Tuesday Supply Awakens Packing and Shipping Interests—Top \$9.55. Stock Yards, Chicago, June 15.—After a slow start the hog market became quite active. Prices were fully 5c higher than Monday's best time, with the finish strong. Speculators were free buyers all day and shippers had liberal orders for Tuesday. A strong and higher market for hog products improved the late trade at the yards. Packers bought freely late, yet 5,500 were carried over, many of them being held off the market on order from the country. Selected light and butchers reach \$9.55 and packing droves averaging 244@260 lbs cost \$9.43@9.48. Receipts were estimated late at 12,000 or a few thousand below expectations. Quality was good with the average weight heavier than a week ago.
