ALBIA AUTORACES BIG SUCCESS

SIX THOUSAND PEOPLE TO SEE TAYLOR IN A RACE WIN FIRST MONEY

Albia, June 17.—(Special)—Six thousand people were at the fair grounds yesterday to witness Albia's first automobile races. The track was in fine condition and the four races were finished in quick time. The first run was made by cars of \$1,500 or less value and the distance covered was five miles. Taylor won first honors, while Livingston took second, McClure came in third and Cokenour fourth. Time—7 minutes 10 seconds.

The two-mile run by the two-cylinder cars was won in 2 minutes 32 seconds by McCreary, with Caldwell in second place.

A five-mile race for cars of \$1,000 or less in value was taken by McClure in 7 minutes 53 seconds. Cokenour won second honors and Livingston third.

In the last race the cars were started 20 seconds apart. Taylor came in first, Livingston second, McClure third and Cokenour fourth. The time was as follows: Taylor, 7:03; Livingston, 7:59; McClure, 8:01, and Cokenour 8:27 1/2.

In the two-mile novelty race, the rules called for the carrying of passengers 1/2 mile, then unload and reload at the end of the mile. Some of the passengers hit the dust before regaining their equilibrium.

The procession was composed of 61 cars, headed by the Albia band. It was formed on the public square and reached the grounds so as to open the races promptly at 2 o'clock.
