BILL BEFORE HOUSE INCLUDES MANY ITEMS AFFECTING THIS STATE.

Washington, D. C., June 20.—The \$18,500,000 public building bill was introduced in the house Saturday afternoon by Congressman Barthold of Missouri, chairman of the committee which has made up the measure from the several hundred appropriation bills for public buildings introduced by members.
