

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KNOCKED BOY OFF A HORSE

CLYDE OWENS ARRESTED FOR INTOXICATION AND FAST DRIVING.

Driving recklessly about the streets in the East End and endangering the lives of pedestrians, and knocking a little boy off a horse, were the charges against Clyde Owens, aged 19 years, when arrested Sunday night by Officer Saunders. Owens had his hearing in police court this morning and was given three days in jail. Charges of cruelty to animals have been filed against Owens by Jackson Bros., from whose barn Owens rented the horse and rig. He will have his hearing on this charge tomorrow morning. They pleaded guilty when arraigned before Police Judge Morrissey this morning and were given ten days each in the county jail. Ten days in the city jail was the sentence meted out to David Henderson of Dubuque, a crippled vag who was arrested Sunday night by Officer Harris for begging on the street. Henderson became very abusive to the officer when taken into custody and attempted to resist arrest. He was severely lectured by the magistrate and must serve out his sentence by pounding rock on the rock pile.
