GROWS GOOD RYE SOUTH OF RIVER

SWITCHMAN - FARMER BRINGS SPECIMENS OF CROP TO COURIER, SHOWING FINE GRAIN.



If anyone has the idea that nothing but corn thrives in Iowa, and that about Ottumwa no other grain crop can be raised with a profit, it behooves such minders to visit the farm of W. J. Kelly, four miles south of the river and see how rye is raised. Farmer Kelly does not devote his whole time to agriculture however, but instead aids the Hill interests to earn dividends by carrying freight safely and expeditiously from the east to west and visa versa. William Kelly is a veteran switchman for the Burlington and the writ and hard of the north side switching crew, whose better judgment is not wasted, and whose time when not engaged in pulling pins and cutting trains, is devoted to making the earth yield its full crops of grain and produce.

The land of the switchman-farmer is farmed by W. A. Jacobs and party of it consists of forty acres of northern rye. The appearance of the grain denotes that two qualities have been combined, good seed and expert farming on land good to farm. The seed for this rye was obtained from Farmer Clancy on Soap Creek and a sample of the grain in hand of the north side of rye was brought to the Courier office by Mr. Kelly. The grain measures five feet and eight inches in height. It will run thirty-eight bushels to the acre, has five and a half inch tips and is full headed.

Along with the specimens of his rye crop, Mr. Kelly brought a sample of hazel brush that grows in abundance on a portion of his land and on one stalk, one-fourth inch thick, no less than twenty-nine clusters of hazel nuts hang. Farming is not a new experiment with Mr. Kelly, for a long time ago he conceived the idea of providing against the day when railroading would become irksome and to meet this contingency he invested in farm land. A periodical vacation from the hazardous and wearing work of the railroad yards, finds the switchman-farmer tilling the soil and living close to nature. The wisdom of his course has fully demonstrated itself.

LICENSE COST IS MADE LOWER

AFFIDAVIT CHARGE OF TWENTY-FIVE CENTS TAKEN OFF HUNTERS' PERMIT.

Hunters in Wapello county who take delight at times during the year in going forth with gun and dog in search of the elusive bob white and other feathery and furry creatures, will rejoice in the consideration granted by the board of supervisors on the suggestion of Auditor C. W. McCarty. The addition fee of twenty-five cents that has been assessed against the purchaser of a hunting license in the county, will for the present be abolished and for such time as present fund created by the additional quarter charge shall last to defray expenses of the county in that particular. The charge was ordered by a resolution in the board sessions when the license fee was imposed, as the full amount of the license was collected by the county but the entire amount went into the coffers of the state. Some little expense was incurred by the county in acting as agent for the state in the license matter and some means had to be devised to remunerate the county for the expense incurred. This gave rise to the additional charge. The following recommendation from Auditor McCarty to the board of supervisors which has been approved by that body rescinds the resolution:

To the honorable board of supervisors: I desire to recommend for your consideration to rescind former resolution of the board authorizing the collection of 25 cents for issuing affidavits for hunters' license by reason of already having collected \$245.00 on last year's business, which amount will cover all expenses to Wapello county for some time. Last year's expenses was approximately \$25.00 to \$40.00. Collection can be resumed when necessary. Respectfully submitted, C. W. McCarty, county auditor.
