



## RHEIMS AERIAL MEET IS ENDED

MANY NEW MARKS SET BY AVIATORS AT BETHANY PLAINS COMPETITIONS.

Bethany Plains, Rheims, France, July 11.—The international aviation meeting, at which new records for height, distance, speed and time were set, came to a close Sunday. The meeting was a triumph for the monoplane, which made all the records and carried off the majority of the prizes.  
The experts declare that the most important achievement was the record made by Leon Morane, who Saturday attained a speed of 106 kilometers (65.93 miles) an hour. They believe that this will be followed soon by a speed of 180 to 200 kilometers, at which speed aeroplanes would be little affected by the wind. The moment is in sight they think, when travel by aeroplane will be as safe and twice as fast as by train.  
The distance and duration records established by M. Labouchere Saturday, 340 kilometers (211.14 miles) in 4 hours and 37 minutes and 45 seconds, were broken yesterday by Oleslagers, who made a magnificent flight of 333 kilometers (244.44 miles) in 5 hours 3 minutes and 5 seconds. On landing, Oleslagers was handed a telegram of congratulation from the king of the Belgians.  
Morane, who covered five kilometers (3.10 miles) in 2 minutes and 56 seconds, and ten kilometers in 5 minutes 47 seconds, succeeded in bettering the records Sunday, covering the five kilometers in 2 minutes 53 seconds and the ten in 5 minutes 42 seconds. He also carried off the speed prize for twenty kilometers (12.44 miles) in 12 minutes 45 seconds.  
The cross country prize over a twenty-two kilometer course was won by Leblanc in a monoplane. Officers' prize for a flight of 100 kilometers went to Lieutenant G. Moran, in company with Lieutenant Pequant, at the close of the meet left on a machine for the camp where he is stationed. The only American competitor, Weymann, while he did not win a prize, made a consistently good showing.  
In another flight last evening Morane further reduced the time for five kilometers, covering the distance in 2 minutes and 45 seconds, a speed of more than 110 kilometers (68.42 miles) an hour.
