## FIRE POTS SAVE APPLE ORCHARD

FREMONT MAN HAS A 1910 CROP DUE TO BURNING CRUDE OIL.

Des Moines, Aug. 12.—In all Iowa there is only one full bearing apple orchard this year. It is the property of C. E. Mincer of Fremont county and its well laden trees bear testimony to the value of painstaking care and scientific methods in fruit growing and farming.  
Mr. Mincer fortified his orchard against the late frosts that destroyed the apple blossoms throughout this section of the west. He laid in a generous supply of crude petroleum and fire pots and during the cold nights he kept up a thousand fires and smudges in his orchard. It meant an outlay of money and much patient labor, but it paid. The blossoms were saved and his trees will yield a 90 per cent crop, whose value in the market at the nearest town of Hamburg is estimated at not less than \$10,000.

What Mr. Mincer did, other fruit growers might have done by the same scientific fight against frost. In these modern days the big profits in all agricultural industry are for those who proceed intelligently and scientifically and not by chance and haphazard. In the cultivation of high priced lands, there are adequate returns only for those who adopt the best methods. Mr. Mincer's experience should hasten the time when every year will be a remarkably good fruit year in Iowa.

**D. C. Bradley Retires From Centerville First National to Give Attention to Other Interests.**  
Centerville, Aug. 12.—D. C. Bradley today resigned the presidency of the first national bank of Centerville. Mr. Bradley was first employed by the first national bank on January 1, 1877, as bookkeeper and clerk. He has been a director of the bank for the past 30 years and retired from the past 12 years, and retired from the active management at this time solely to be relieved of the responsibility.
