

Keokuk, Aug. 15.—(Special).—Ottumwa and Keokuk broke even in yesterday's double bill, the Redskins winning the first game by the score of 3 to 2 in thirteen innings and the Speed Boys taking the final battle by the score of 5 to 3. The last game also went extra innings and the hundreds of Keokuk fans were kept on the anxious seat in the two mixes.

It looked as Belt's Indians had the first game carefully stored away when the Speed Boys did the ninth rally stung to perfection and tied the score. Both teams retired in rapid order in the three following innings and in the thirteenth frame, Keokuk sent the needed score over the plate although Ottumwa threatened to score several times.

Second was exciting. The second game was as exciting as the first and the big feature of it all was the twirling of Charles Jeager, one of Keokuk's cast offs whom Manager Egan numbers as one of his best twirlers. Jeager got sweet revenge on his team mates and demonstrated to "Pa" Belt in an easy manner that he let loose of a prize when he handed him his blue slip. Jeager's twirling in the second game was no less than delicious. He held down his old mates to six bingles while the Speed Boys landed on "Rube" Burch in a vicious manner. Burch's curves were like candy to the Speed Boys and he was driven from the slab. The veteran "Pop" Eyerler then attempted to stop the hitting but Ottumwa bunched the safeties on him in the tenth.

LABORER DIES FROM INJURIES

PETE GOURAS WHO WAS STRUCK BY BROKEN HOOK SATURDAY DIED LAST NIGHT.

Struck in the abdomen by a hook which broke while lifting rails from a car west of Albia Saturday near noon. Pete Gouras, a Greek laborer on the Burlington was removed to the Ottumwa hospital where he died last night at 8 o'clock. The accident occurred two miles west of Tower No. 307 about 11:45 a. m. Gouras with other laborers was engaged in removing rails from cars at that point where track improvement is being carried on. A hook fast to a cable was used in removing the rails from the cars, and one of the rails catching against a bolt on the car, caused the hook to break and hurling through the air struck Gouras in the abdomen. He was brought to Ottumwa and taken to the hospital where he died last evening.
