

OTTUMWA MAN IS GROUND TO DEATH BY CARS

MICHAEL DAILY RUN OVER BY TRAIN AND LIES ALL NIGHT SUFFERING AGONIES BEFORE HELP REACHES HIM.

Falling from a moving freight train half a mile east of Batavia about 11 o'clock last night, Michael Daily sustained the loss of both legs and died at the hospital at 1:30 this afternoon. The injured man was not found until 7 o'clock this morning, having remained along the tracks all the intervening hours unable to attract attention to his sad plight. The discovery of Daily was made this morning shortly before 7 o'clock by Conductor James Sullivan, who was coming west on an extra, and unable to pick up the crew of No. 92 which brought him to Batavia. Upon the arrival of No. 3, the morning passenger train, the young man was brought to Ottumwa and immediately taken to the hospital where a large number of surgeons were soon busy giving their attention to the injuries. So serious were the injuries of the young man, that little hope was held out for his recovery. The loss of blood incident with the fact that he remained there unaided from 11 p. m. until 7 a. m., left but a poor chance for recovery. Notwithstanding the fact that he lay so long unaided, and that train after train passed each way over his injured members, each adding to the wounds already made, the grit and nerve of the sufferer was sufficient to maintain his consciousness and he was in a sitting posture when seen by Conductor Sullivan this morning. Mr. Daily stated that he had boarded the freight train in Ottumwa last night intending to go to Burlington, and that a short distance east of Batavia, he fell from the train with the above result. The young man was 29 years of age, and resided at 723 East Main street. By occupation he was a butcher worker and had worked for a time in the local packing plant. He was a member of the Eagles of Ft. Worth, Tex. aerie.

A sister, Miss Sadie Daily of this city and his aunt, Mrs. James Murphy, survive him. The funeral will be held Saturday, the hour to be announced later.

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SOPHIA HARRIS HELD NOT GUILTY

JURY IN PROSTITUTION CASE RETURN VERDICT FAVORABLE TO THE DEFENDANT.

After retiring last evening about 5:15, the jury in the case of state vs. Sophia Harris, charged with prostitution, returned a verdict this morning of not guilty. The verdict was made known at the beginning of court this morning. Immediately following the hearing of the verdict, the case of the state against Bennie Junkin and Otto Barter, charged with jumping from a moving train, was begun. These young colored men were originally charged with attempt to assault a Milwaukee brakeman while stealing a ride on a freight train about Ottumwa. The grand jury failed to return an indictment on this charge, but instead charged the two men with jumping from a train in motion. Conductor G. A. Bingham and brakeman Bert McGraw were on the stand before noon. It was the train in their charge that the two colored young men are alleged to have ridden when the act for which they are charged took place.

FAST RACING AT ALBIA FAIR

WERE VERY CLASSY—WON IN STRAIGHT HEATS.

EXHIBITS ARE LARGE

Over 5,000 People Were on the Grounds Yesterday—Vaudeville Acts Were Pleasing—Tomorrow's Program.

Albia, Sept. 30.—(Special).—The first day's racing at the Monroe county fair here Wednesday was featured by many fast harness events. Wednesday was in reality the first day of the great Monroe county exhibition and it is estimated that there were 5,000 people on the grounds to witness the races and other entertainment provided by the fair officials. The exhibits in all lines are in place and are large and extensive. The agricultural and live stock exhibits are fine, showing the quality of products raised in Monroe and adjacent counties. The Albia merchants are co-operating in making the fair a success by large exhibits, and in all departments the second year's meeting of the Monroe County Fair association promises to eclipse all records.

The racing cards provide the greatest attraction, but the vaudeville acts before the amphitheater also attract much attention. George and Georgie in their trapeze act, hay rack tumbling and trick horse were clever, while Nid and Nod, who scored a big hit at the Labor Day celebration, astounded the audience in the juggling and barrel jumping feats.
