and plain natives, which met competition from the west. Range steers topped at \$8.90, with a fair quota of good heavy grades at \$6.50 and bulk of 1,100 to 1,250 lb westerns went at \$5.50. Range feeders sold up to \$5.40, but most of this westerns went below \$5.

Demand for native steers was strong throughout the week and prices closed 10@20c lower, while bulls showed an advance of 15@20c. Calves were off 2c at the mill, popping at \$10. ### HOGS BOOSTED A' CLOSE.

Values for Good Grades Boosted 10 to 15 Cents Higher at Chicago Saturday.  
Stock Yards, Chicago, Oct. 17.—In spite of big receipts, totaling 74,000 lb were included. Under this short run the packers were forced to pay 5@10c advance for good grades at the start, and heavy and mixed packing classes were still firm to 5c higher. Later there was a liberal share of the heavy packing grades were bought at the level of the previous day. Shippers took nearly a third of the supply, and this demand was the price boosting factor. Average price was made at \$5.54, which stood 5c higher than Friday and 15c above a week ago. Prime lights and light butchers topped at \$9.33, while best 250 lb weights went at \$9.10 and the 250@300 lb hogs of good grade cleared at \$8.80@9.00. Mixed packing classes were bought by local houses at \$8.15@8.40, while bulk of heavy packing grades made \$8.20@8.30. Quotations follow:
