CARROLL WINS IN JEFFERSON

ENTIRE REPUBLICAN TICKET CARRIED THROUGH BY GOOD MAJORITY.

Fairfield, Nov. 9.—Sixteen precincts out of eighteen in Jefferson county, give Carroll 1,537, Porter 1,094. For congressman the same precincts give Kennedy 1,846, Pollard 932.
In Jefferson county the entire republican ticket is probably elected, although it is possible that Ready (Dem) has defeated Munro (Rep) for county attorney. Sixteen precincts give Ready 1,280, Munro 1,271.
In same precincts, Burkhart (Rep) received 1,293 for auditor, against Moberg (Dem) 1,253. For clerk in same precincts Hays (Rep) received 1,421 and Long (Dem) 1,145.

CARROLL CARRIES DAVIS

Governor Takes Home County By Twelve; Democrats Almost Make a Sweep.

Bloomfield, Nov. 9.—(Special)—Governor Carroll carried Davis, his home county, by a majority of twelve. Hamilton, democratic candidate for congress, got 213 majority. These returns are from seventeen out of the eighteen precincts in the county. Soap Creek township being yet to hear from. The democrats carried the entire county ticket except the office of county attorney, C. W. Ramseyer defeating Crawford Davis.

MONROE IS REPUBLICAN

Griffin Re-elected Sheriff By Big Majority; Bates, Democrat, a Winner.

Albia, Nov. 9.—(Special)—With half the vote of Monroe county counted it is evident that Kendall will have a majority of at least 1,200 in the county. Carroll has a majority of 600 in the county. Griffin was re-elected sheriff by from 1,200 to 1,500 majority. Walsh, democrat, for clerk, seems to go in the lead. D. W. Bates, democrat, is re-elected county attorney. The rest of the ticket is republican.

G.O.P. IN KEOKUK COUNTY

All But Two of the Republican Officials Were Elected; Hamilton Gains.

Sigourney, Nov. 9.—(Special)—All but two of the county offices, sheriff and one member of the board of supervisors, were captured by the republicans. Dan Hamilton carried the county in the wards thus far canvassed, his ratio of gain making it appear that he will have 150 more than two years ago. Carroll carried the county by a good vote.

Democrats Get Majorities at Bonaparte

Bonaparte, Nov. 9.—(Special)—Election passed off very quietly here an average vote being polled. The following are the majorities: Porter for governor 19; Pollard for congress 8; Ballman democrat for representative 39; Duckworth democrat county auditor 11; Meek democrat county treasurer 98; Truax republican county clerk 2; Jertich democrat sheriff 43; Sharp democrat recorder 44; McCormick democrat county attorney 30; Miss Meredith county superintendent 38; Jenkins democrat surveyor 11; Ware republican corner 1; Wallingford democrat supervisor 58; Hale democrat supervisor 4.

Vermillion Leads Ticket

Centerville, Nov. 9.—(Special)—Porter carried Appanose by 150. Towner's (congressman) majority is about 500; W. r. Daniels (state representative) 500. The republicans elected all the county ticket except auditor, sheriff and superintendent of schools.

Vermillion lead all the ticket by about 150. His majority is something over 500; Eichelberger 350, and Anderson 350. Hunter carried the county over Richmond by 200 to 300.

Des Moines County.

Burlington, Nov. 9.—(Special)—Leonard Coville, republican, has been elected to the state senate over Fred Smith, present incumbent. Henry Ritter, democrat, is elected representative. Porter will carry Des Moines county by 1,500. Pollard for congress is running neck and neck with Kennedy in Des Moines county. Pollard carried the city of Burlington by 131. Kennedy will carry the first district by 2,000.

Muscatine County.

Muscatine, Nov. 9.—(Special)—Complete returns in Muscatine county gives Porter 3,112, Carroll 2,855.

Dubuque County.

Dubuque, Nov. 9.—(Special)—Porter has carried Dubuque county by 4,400.

Des Moines County.

Burlington, Nov. 9.—(Special)—Incomplete returns give Porter a plurality in Des Moines county of 939.

Harrison County.

Logan, Nov. 9.—(Special)—Carroll's majority in Harrison county is 254. Cleveland E. Crow is elected in the district by 700.

Boone County.

Boone, Nov. 9.—(Special)—In twenty-four out of twenty-eight precincts, Carroll 2042, Porter 1363, Goodykoontz for legislature carries county by 1,090.
