BIG CHUNKS STEADY.

Eastern Buyers are Taking Extreme Weight and Finished Drafters at Even Prices.

Stock Yards, Chicago, Nov. 16.—Receipts of horses for the first two days this week total 742 head, against 512 last week and 661 for the like period a year ago. With the approach of the International Live Stock Exposition and Horse Show receipts normally decrease, but consignments are larger than a year ago, notwithstanding the unsatisfactory conditions that always accompany a transition of a market from a high to a lower level. Many eastern buyers are executing orders for big drafters and feeders at fairly steady values. Stall-finished lots weighing from 1,800 to 2,000 pounds of blocky conformation and good quality, are clearing at \$275@350, while fair to good 1,600-pound chunks are selling around \$175@230, and 1,700-pound chunks go at \$225@250. Medium-weight chunks are out-of-season classes and clear mostly by first cost. Small cotton mules are active at \$125@175, with heavy truck mules in fair request at \$200@300. The forward

BIG MIDWEST CATTLE SUPPLY.

Tuesday Trade Largely in Ranges, Though Many Sell Weaker.

Stock Yards, Chicago, Nov. 16.—Advance report of 1,000 carloads of live stock in sight on three big roads for the market today, had a bad effect on the Tuesday steer trade and prices were down largely 10c from Monday's basis. Selling opened on a steady level, but the demand quit sharply in middle hours and thereafter all the natives and rangers could not be sold. Best natives went at \$6.40 for fat yearlings while the demand for the first rounder at private sale and command higher prices than above auction quotations.

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### CHICAGO HOG BREAK UNCHECKED.

Market Closes on Bottom, With Extreme Decline Prominent in All Grades.

Stock Yards, Chicago, Nov. 16.—After a 10c to 15c lower start the hog market weakened and closed 20@20c off from best time Monday. The average at \$1.53 was 22c off, being 44c lower than a week ago and lowest day since early in October of last year. The

average stands \$1.25 lower than four weeks ago and \$2.50 lower than March 18, which was high day of the year and the highest day in over forty years. Packers were extremely bearish, still at the finish only 4,500 remained in the pens. A few loads sold early in the forenoon, but later it was hard work to get above \$7.55 for best offerings. Big packing droves, averaging 190@250 lbs cost \$7.49@7.55. The range of prices was narrow, few selling below \$7.40. Shippers purchased only 1,000 and speculators secured very few. The market closed top heavy with packers talking lower prices for the near future. Quotations follow:
