Traveling Man Won Woman Who Won Office in Wright County.

Eagle Grove, Nov. 24.—That Carrie Vaughn Anderson, whose whirlwind and successful campaign for the office of county recorder of Wright county, was stolen a march upon her friends, relatives and the voters of the county became known when it was discovered that she was married more than two months ago to W. Lucas, a traveling salesman. During the entire time that Mrs. Anderson was making her fight before the election the fact of her marriage was a closely guarded secret and it was not until the office was safely landed that the story of the wedding became known.

The sensational fight of Mrs. Carrier Anderson Lucas before the primary and then again before the election several weeks ago is known, not only in the state, but was spoken of at the time in almost every paper from St. Paul and St. Louis. She went into the primaries against an old campaigner, who was both shrewd and popular, and in the manner in which she won the fight single handed has left the politicians of Wright county gasping for breath as she carried seventeen out of twenty-two precincts. Immediately after the primary she began her fight to land the office and won "hands down."
