College Insurance \$73,000.

Sioux City, May 3.—President A. E. Craig, J. C. Lockin, secretary of the board of trustees of Morningglade college, and J. G. Shumaker, the trustee in charge of the college insurance auditor, are conferring over the adjustment of the losses on the main college building, destroyed by fire Monday night.

A meeting of the board of trustees probably will be called for next week, when plans for rebuilding will be considered. The next regular meeting of the board is set for June. Dean Sidney L. Chandler stated that plans for the replacing of the structure would be rushed by the trustees. The insurance on the building and contents will amount to practically \$73,000. The insurance had been increased in the last year. The main hall was insured for \$60,000. The large pipe organ was covered by \$5,000 insurance. It was valued at \$6,000. About \$5,000 was carried on the contents. Dean Chandler estimated that the total damage was \$110,000.

Carnegie Hero Medal for Iowa. Cedar Rapids, May 3.—Word has just been received here that Thomas F. Gallagher of Cedar Rapids is to receive a hero medal and \$1,000 cash from the Carnegie commission for bravery shown in the rescue of three men from a mine at Pittston, Pa., where Gallagher was employed. He entered the shaft after a gas explosion at the peril of his life and got his fellow employes to a place of safety.
