

The Niagara of the South

Tullulah Falls, in the Georgia Mountains, to be Harnessed, Will Develop 100,000 Electrical Horse Power.

Not quite a hundred miles northeast of Atlanta, Georgia, is one of the finest cataracts in the country, long known as "The Niagara of the South." The Georgia Power Company is harnessing this falling water to giant turbine water wheels, which will be used to drive electric generators, producing a hundred thousand horse power of electrical energy.

The work under construction embraces principally two dams, the tunnel, the forebay, the power house, together with five main substations. The main power dam is being built of rock taken from a quarry just below the site of the dam. It will measure 384 feet long by 112 feet high. The upper dam, about eight miles upstream and designed for storage purposes, is to be 650 feet long by 90 feet high.
