

At her home in Udell, Iowa, Appanoose county, Aug. 15, 1913, Mrs. Katie Fritz-Wolfe, wife of Elder Abraham Fritz, was born in Hancock county, Ohio, Jan. 18, 1843 and was 70 years of age at her death. She immigrated with her parents, Elder John and Minerva Fritz to Iowa in 1854 and settled in Keokuk county, near Ollie where she made her home for a great many years.

She was married to Elder Abraham Wolf Sept. 16, 1860, who survives her. She is survived by one brother, J. S. Fritz of Denver, Colo., who attended the funeral and nine children. She was a fine Christian woman of noble character and wonderful personality; a true helpmate, wife and mother. Her first thought was of husband and children, their welfare and happiness were foremost in her mind. She was sick for several years and suffered untold misery, yet ever uncomplaining, ever looking ahead to that haven of rest, the glories she is now enjoying.
