


# And Jeff Wasn't Far Wrong at That

## GOSSIPERS PLAYED BY THE EVANGELIST

**BOTH SEXES COME IN FOR THEIR SHARE OF CONDEMNATION AT ALBIA REVIVAL.**

**MANY HEAR SERMON**

Topic of Dr. Oliver's Lecture is "Forgiveness." Interest in meetings Continues to Show Signs Of Growth.

(Special Correspondence.)

Albia, Nov. 19.—Designating gossipers as the sewer systems of a community, Evangelist Oliver last night hit the crowd of "tattlers" who stir up troubles in every community. Hate is a child of hell according to his definition and no one can expect the eternal bliss, who will not forgive. His sermon was on "Forgiveness" and from comments heard it was on a subject much needed here. Not only did he score the "fairer sex" for their part in the common gossip of the neighborhood but he handed a solar plexus blow to the men who sit around the stoves in the grocery stores, cigar stands, and pool halls and gossip and lie about their neighbors. They were ten times worse than the women he said. And the women cheered and said "Amen."

**Many Hear Sermon.**

The attendance was large. The record breaking crowd of Sunday night, when hundreds were turned away, had left its impress and the audience began to gather earlier than usual to be sure of having a seat. The choir was up to its usual standard and under the efficient leadership of Mr. Allen the music had an added interest. The active interest is increasing and there is an under-current of sentiment that means much for the future days of the meeting. The business men are interested and the big tabernacle draws many that never go inside a church. The meetings are the talk of the town and it is the one big thing that has the mind of the people. The prayer meetings are well attended. A special prayer service for young ladies is held each evening in charge of Miss Scott while the young men meet at the same time in the U. B. church with Mr. Fath, the pianist. A number of the young people are being thus definitely enlisted in the campaign.

The subject for tonight will be, "Where fell your axe-head?"

Some extracts from Dr. Oliver's sermon of Tuesday night follow:

**Extracts From Sermon.**

In the days when the morning stars sang together and the sons of God shouted for joy, man rebelled against his Maker, and lifted his puny fist in the face of Infinity, and God shut the gates of Eden in his face; and rebellion kindled its deadly fires within the precincts of man's affections, and the hounds of enmity and disobedience, lust and greed, malice and murder chased man from the sacred precincts of innocence and Cain reared: "Am I my brother's keeper?" when murder had built its nest in his heart and reddened his hands with his brother's blood. Mercy and Justice engaged in mortal combat, and for more than forty centuries the clash of arms resounded; but the fires of eternal love surged and rolled throughout the fields of battle, until mercy scaled the ramparts of justice and judgment and proclaimed the dawn of peace on earth, good will to man; but it cost the Son of God the agonies of a bloody sweat in Gethsemane, an dthe pang of crucifixion on the cross of Calvary. The gospel of love is the hope of this world, the hope of the church. How I love to see it in action in our meetings; how I love to hear of the homes made glad by the power of the love of God burying these old differences in grace, and making enemies friends.

**Forgiveness Necessary.**

You must forgive, if you expect forgiveness from God. Church member with a quarrel against any, think now what that means. It means forgiveness or hell. Oh, the homes, churches and cities torn asunder by this horrid disease reigning in them; until feuds make hearts and assassins out of men and the church or home or city thus poisoned becomes a cesspool of death to love, peace and happiness.

The most miserable wretch in this

world is the one who is carrying a grudge in his heart against a fellow man. It blots the sunshine from the face, and clouds of darkest passions assemble their inglorious hosts and play havoc with the faculties of that miserable life. The older the grudge grows the stronger it grows, and as it develops, the soul withers, the manhood character dwarfs and dies until at the last the life goes out as a candle having been burned at both ends. The canker of the soul will sooner or later become the death of the body; for, "as a man thinketh in his heart, so is he."

Do you know what reconciliation means? That is one of the sweetest words in the human vocabulary. Reconciliation means the cessation of hostilities, the end of strife, the dawn of peace. Strife in the home is deadly, in the nation ruinous, and under conditions of strife peace is cheap at any price.

**An Age Of Peace.**

There was a time when lavic fires ran hissing through the bowels of the earth, and touching internal streams, threw volcanoes with their angry heads skyward, and as they opened their fearful maws of destruction, sea and air and land trembled at the shock but islands were formed, and continents were made, while Vulcan's fires burned on and Cyclops' anvil rang; and today we enjoy the age of geological peace, as we look upon lofty mountains where the snow-capped fathers of the foothills reigning in regal splendor serene, dignified, magnificent; or we feast our eyes upon the prairies and behold the lap of luxury where fields of ripened grain wave their bearded heads and invite the reapers to cheer their season of labor with songs of "Harvest home."

There is no stronger evidence of a man's conversion than the fact of the spirit of forgiveness being manifested within him. The natural man has the "eye for eye" spirit, he is jammed full of it.

You can see it in the aisles of the church when a neighbor is rebuked and he becomes a geologist and the other an astronomer; yet they sing: "Glory to God, I'm on my journey home." Do you expect God to build a high board fence between your mansions in heaven? Let me give you a pointer, if your heart does not take in the whole world, you have not taken Christ into your heart.

Don't talk to me about the peculiar situation, and think to have just the same for not forgiving. No matter how you have been wronged, you have sinned against God more than you have been sinned against. Have you felt the tortures of a bloody sweat, and the agonies of crucifixion? You answer no. Christ suffered it all, besides the beating, scourging, and other indignities, and as he was hanging upon the cross, He looked upon the vilest reprober, that blasphemed his name and cursed his suffering, and said: "Father forgive them, they know not what they do."

The court finds that the said Barrett & Kling, a corporation, a defendant herein, is not a resident of this judicial district; has no place of business in this judicial district, and has no officer or agent within this judicial district.

The court finds as a matter of fact that by the article of incorporation of the said defendant, Barrett & Kling, that the defendant agreed to have, and for quite a period of time did have, and maintain an office at Cedar Rapids, Iowa, being within the northern judicial district of this state; but the court further finds that at all times since this action was commenced the said Barrett & Kling has not maintained an office at Cedar Rapids, Iowa, or at any other point within the state of Iowa, and has had no officer or agent within the state of Iowa at any time since this action was commenced, unless Crosby & Fordyce, attorneys at law, of Cedar Rapids, Iowa, are agents or representatives of said corporation, a point not now ruled on.

The court further finds that the said defendant corporation, Barrett & Kling, has at no time complied with section 1612 of the supplement to the Iowa code by designating the secretary of state of the state of Iowa as a party upon whom service could be made, and authorizing him to accept service of

notice or summons for the bringing or pendency of an action in any court.

The said Barrett & Kling has heretofore filed plea to the jurisdiction of this court, which plea has been submitted to the court, and which said plea was continued by the court for further consideration. The court further finds that the said corporation, Barrett & Kling, is now engaged in erecting and constructing a public work within the state of Nebraska for the government of the United States, and that all of its officers and agents are now in the state of Nebraska engaged in such work and will be for quite a period of time in the future, the exact time not being known to the court. But the court in making the foregoing findings does not rule as to whether or not said Crosby & Fordyce are agents of the said Barrett & Kling, reserving that question for future consideration.

The court further finds that C. L. Bartlett is the president, general manager, secretary and treasurer of the said Barrett & Kling, and the court further finds that there is no other office of said corporation.

The court finds that this action is to recover for claims for material and labor in the erection of the government building at Ottumwa, Iowa, on a bond given by Barrett & Kling to the United States.

The court therefore orders in open court, in the presence of counsel for the plaintiff and in the presence of counsel presenting this plea, as follows:

This case coming on to be heard upon the original application, and also upon the amendment to the motion for service of summons or notice on the said defendant, Barrett & Kling, it is the order of the court that it be the said defendant, Barrett & Kling, appear in this court and plead, answer or demur herein on Tuesday, the 26th day of March, A. D., 1914, at 1:30 o'clock in the afternoon of said day. And it appearing to the court that this suit was commenced by the said plaintiff on the 28th day of July, 1913, by filing a petition herein against the said Barrett & Kling, it is ordered that the said American Radiator Company, for whose use and benefit this case is brought, was then, at all times has been and still is a citizen and resident of the state of New Jersey, maintaining an office in the city of Chicago, state of Illinois, and the said American Radiator Company is an inhabitant of the district of New Jersey and of the said state of Illinois.

And the court being of the opinion and so finds that the said application should be granted.

It is ordered that the said Barrett & Kling, a corporation, defendant herein, shall appear, plead, answer or demur to said petition of the plaintiff on or before the hour of 1:30 of the afternoon of said 26th day of March, A. D., 1914, that being the second day of the next term of this court, at the court room thereof in the city of Ottumwa, Wapello county, Iowa.

## FIND COAL VEIN FIVE FEET THICK

**NEW MINES AT BIDWELL BID FAIR TO BECOME GOOD SIZED MINING CAMP.**

The Bidwell Coal Co., has reached coal in its new shaft at Bidwell and the vein runs to a thickness of five feet and ten inches and is very gratifying to the operators of the new mining venture. The opening of the mine adds another to the several coal industries adjacent to Ottumwa. The outlook for the new venture is very bright as the men in charge are well known Illinois and Iowa mine operators and are familiar with coal mining in its every phase.

The intention is to develop the field which in extent runs from 400 to 600 acres under which is laid a good strata of coal. The men in charge are reticent as to making predictions beyond the merest statement regarding the prospects for their new mine. They say that the output when the mine is underway will be 1,000 tons gross daily. As the property develops it is expected to make a mining camp at Bidwell that will bring hundreds of people to that locality.

**KEOKUK CO. FARMER TAKES OWN LIFE**

Siourney, Nov. 18.—Word was received Saturday of the death by hanging of Nicholas Gries, a prosperous farmer living two miles south of Harper. Recently Mr. Gries had sold his farm and it was known that he had been brooding over this fact, beyond that no cause for the rash act is known. Friday evening shortly after 10 o'clock he left his house and went to the barn and as he did not return right away the family became alarmed and began to search for him. His son went to the barn and found him hanging by a rope fastened to a rafter. Life was not extinct when found but he died a few moments after.

Mr. Gries was about 50 years of age and leaves his wife and several children, also one brother Peter Gries of near Harper, and one sister, Elizabeth Gries of Dubuque.
