### FEDERAL COURT SESSION OPENS

that time it was continued until the present session.  
Other cases which have been continued are those of the J. M. Dodge Co. vs. Ottumwa Box Car Loader Co., L. E. Goode vs. Chicago, Burlington and Quincy Railroad Co., L. E. Goode vs. Adams Express Co., State of Iowa ex. rel., John McCutcheon vs. Oskaloosa Traction & Light Co., and J. E. Winslow vs. Chicago, Burlington and Quincy Railroad Co. Another case entitled L. E. Goode vs. C. B. & Q. railroad has been settled and dismissed. The case entitled L. L. Taylor, administrator of the estate of August Menzer vs. C. B. & Q. railroad has been settled and dismissed. In the case of the United States for the use and benefit of the American Radiator Co., vs. Bartlett and King three motions have been made. These are, one for security of costs, one for transferring the case to the equity side of the docket and one to dismiss. Wednesday morning at 9 o'clock has been set as the time for the hearing of all three of these motions. The case of C. H. Swain vs. Chicago, Rock Island and Pacific has been set for Tuesday morning at 9 o'clock.

**Decrees are Signed.**  
Two decrees were signed this morning by Judge McPherson. One is in the case of Rolla W. Cornell, trustee of the estate of Joe H. Douglas, bankrupt, against J. F. Martin. By this decree Miss Rilla Stain, deputy clerk, is ordered to take the testimony and this testimony is to stand and be regarded as taken in deposition. In the case of Charles W. Smallwood, trustee in bankruptcy, of the estate of Thomas Moore against George Moore, Thomas Moore et al., a decree reversing the ruling of the referee who held that certain property connected with the case was subject to sale by the trustee for the use of creditors. The decree orders that the order of the referee be modified to read that the sale of this property be made subject to existing valid mortgages and not with a clear title as it now reads.

**Begin Doughty Case.**  
With the opening of court at 2 o'clock this afternoon the case of C. H. Doughty vs. Doughty is charged with using the United States mails to defraud and was given his preliminary hearing here before U. S. Commissioner Enoch on January 15. He is alleged to have used the name of Clarence Croft of Agency in purchasing a diamond from Speigel-May Stearn Co., of Chicago by correspondence.
