FEDERAL TROOPS TO SUBDUCE STRIKERS

Washington, D. C., Nov. 3.—Federal troops are being held ready to be ordered to the Hartford Valley, Ark., strike zone. Secretary Garrison said today he would formally announce the war department's intentions before night.

The situation was such that all was needed to move the troops of the department's order. Officials of the department were fully prepared for its issue, estimated that only an eleventh hour development could change the plans.

Federal Judge Youmans has reported he is unable to enforce his orders in the strike zone where mining properties are in the hands of receivers appointed by the United States court and that the deputy marshals have been unable to cope with the situation.

"CITY WATERWORKS" SUBJECT OF DAY

Iowa City, Nov. 3.—"City waterworks" will be the general subject for the municipal day program to be given in this city on November 20.

Professor George F. Kay, state geologist, will speak on "Underground Waters." R. L. Stevenson will have for his subject "Real Accounting Systems for Waterworks," and Professor J. H. Dunlap will explain the waterworks data which he collected during his summer's investigation. "The Analysis of Water" is another subject which will be included in the program.
