RALLY IN MARKET SNIPPED IN THE BUD

PROFIT TAKING SALES OF MOTORS AND SPECIALTIES BRING ABOUT DEPRESSION.

New York, March 15.—Improvements in the foreign situation and rumors of an early decision in the suit of the government against the United States Steel corporation were used to stimulate the stock market during the early trading today. The spurt was not well maintained, however, profit taking in the motors and other specialties soon giving the entire list a setback.

Shares of the various automobile companies were again to the fore in today's early market operations. Gains in these issues ranged from material fractions to almost 3 points, while the more seasoned stocks were less prominent, some of the leaders showing no change from last week's close. Later, however, the list, as a whole, rose merely on light trading. The only notable exception was Texas Co., which lost 1 1/2. Americans were irregular in London.

Bonds were relatively more active than stocks in the early trading. Reaction in the municipal bonds was particularly noticeable. The closing was firm.

PRICE OF WHEAT IS GOING UPWARD

HIGHER QUOTATIONS AT LIVERPOOL INFLUENCE TO AMERICAN MARKETS.

Chicago, March 15.—Higher prices at Liverpool, where there was a large decrease in stocks, had a bullish effect today on the wheat market here. The outlook for a decided falling off in the domestic visible supply total counted also against the bears. Offers were scarce here until the price in some cases had moved up 2 1/2 above Saturday's finish. The opening which ranged from 1/4 to 1 1/2 higher, was followed by a continuous advance until orders to purchase were filled, but then a material reaction took place.

The close was nervous 1/4 to 3/4 up. Smallness of receipts helped to lift the corn market. In addition, one of the largest houses in the trade was a conspicuous buyer of futures. After starting a shade off to 1/4 up, prices scored gains all around.

The close was steady 1/4 to 1 1/4 @ 1% net advance.

Lively commission house demand for oats was in evidence. Pit traders who were short hurried to cover.

Large export clearances tended to steady provisions. On the other hand there was considerable selling in small lots by miscellaneous holders.

DISMISS ACTION AGAINST NICHOLS

STATUTORY CHARGE IS CALLED OFF WHEN CASE IS BROUGHT TO TRIAL.

The case of the state vs. Chris Nichols, charging a statutory offense, was dismissed Saturday evening when called for trial in Justice H. C. Noshel's court.

Nichols was arrested Saturday afternoon by Constable J. M. Huffman upon information that he had been guilty of this offense against Ethel Welsh, aged between eleven and twelve years. Another side of the action is one in which it is alleged that the two are married and that the girl's mother recently went to Albia and swore that her daughter's age was fourteen so that they might secure a license. At the hearing Saturday evening the girl and her mother both swore on the stand that the young lady was born on October 16, 1900, and the court did not consider the evidence sufficient to hold to the grand jury.

Alleging that the woman committed perjury when she swore falsely to the girl's age, Miss Sara A. Brown, secretary of the associated charities of Wapello county, has filed information against her in the Monroe county district court at Albia. When the case will come up is not known here.

DEATH SUMMONS NOTED INVENTOR

Chicago, March 15.—Henry H. Sessions, inventor of the "vestibule" anti-telescoping device used on most railroad passenger cars, the airplane for street cars and several other railroad devices, died at his home here yesterday. He was born in Madrid, N. Y., in 1847. At the time of his death he was vice president of the Standard Coupler Co. of New York.
