### NEGRO ATHLETE WINS NORTHWESTERN MEET

Chicago, March 29.—Northwestern University's sixth annual interscholastic track meet was won Saturday night by the Rock Island high school team. Sol Butler, a negro, who scored all of the 30 points which went to his team.

Butler took first place in the sixty-yard dash, sixty-yard high hurdles, the three-hundred and two yards and the broad jump. In the high hurdles the colored boy, who formerly was a student at the Hutchinson, Kas., high school, tied the world's record, making the jumpsmithson of San Francisco. The former record of the high school meet was made by Zoellin, of Lewis Institute in 1914. His time was :08 2-5.

### AY SELL GROUNDS OF YANK BALL CLUB

New York, March 29.—The old American league park, which comprises one and a half acres fronting on Broadway between One Hundred and Sixty-fifth and One Hundred and Sixty-sixth streets, may be sold as a site for the Presbyterian hospital. The hospital trustees have obtained an option on the property and are to decide within a few weeks whether to purchase it. The property has been held \$2,500,000, but the price demanded for the option was not made public. It is owned by the New York institution for the Education of the Blind.

## HANGING IN IOWA IS STILL LEGAL

SENATE VOTES AGAINST ABOLITION OF CAPITAL PUNISHMENT AFTER DEBATE.

Des Moines, March 29.—After a fight which lasted nearly all morning the senate Saturday defeated a bill by Gillette of Cherokee, providing for the abolition of capital punishment. The vote was 18 for and 23 against.

Judiciary committee No. 1 reported the bill to the senate several days ago with the recommendation that it be indefinitely postponed. This morning Senator Gillette was successful in stirring up enough votes to get the report rejected.

In a lengthy speech, Gillette condemned the present law which leaves it to the jury to decide whether a person convicted of first degree murder shall be hanged. Such a practice, he declared, was uncivilized.

Chase of Hamilton, fiscal of Cedar Rapids, Wilson of Centerville and Taylor of Van Buren argued in behalf of the measure.

## BIG RACING EVENT BY DETROIT CLUB

Detroit, Mich., March 29.—An average of nearly twenty-four horses to the race, the largest Detroit Driving club has ever had, features the list of entries to the classics in the Blue Ribbon racing meeting here July 26 to 31. Despite the fact that the merchants' and manufacturers' \$10,000 stake has been lowered to the 2:08 class, there are already twenty-eight horses entered in the event.

New York, March 29.—Jim Coffey, the Dublin giant, knocked out Soldier Delaney of Brooklyn in the second round of a ten round bout here Saturday. Coffey weighed 200 and Delaney 200.

## WILLIE HOPPE WINS OVER JOSEPH MAYER

Philadelphia, March 29.—Willie Hoppe, the professional champion, Saturday night won a handicap 18.2 billiard match from Joseph Mayer, the amateur champion, the former scoring 2,000 points in the five blocks played to Mayer's 1,394. The stipulation of the match was that Hoppe was to score 2,000 before Mayer made 1,500.

Iowa City, March 29.—Iowa defeated Nebraska in an annual wrestling tournament here Saturday night. Barron, Cocksfoot and Hemmingson threw their men. Cran and Hindt both were awarded a draw and Triplett. This made three wins, one loss, and two draws for Iowa out of six matches.
